FROM THE DESK OF MR. MICHAEL CROZIER, SUPERINTENDENT

During this school year, Northwood-Kensett Community School District tested its MS/HS building for radon. Radon gas cannot be seen, smelled or tasted, and moves upward through cracks and other openings in the foundations of buildings from the soil under a building. In the United States, radon is the leading cause of lung cancer deaths among nonsmokers.

We saved taxpayer dollars by receiving training from the School Radon Training & Support System (SRTSS) on how to accurately do the initial radon testing ourselves. Preliminary test results for the entire building came back below the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) suggested action level of 4 pCi/L, which was good news.

The State of Iowa requires radon testing at least once every 5 years for all Iowa public school attendance centers, licensed preschools and licensed child care centers. We believe all of our staff and students should be safe. The district has proactively placed all of our school building(s) on a multi-year rotating radon test schedule.

For most students and staff, research suggests that schools and workplaces are actually the *second* largest contributors to radon exposure. *The home is likely to be the most significant source of radon exposure.* Please test your home for radon and if necessary, take action to reduce the risk of lung cancer by reducing elevated radon concentrations.



Northwood-Kensett Offers Free Summer Lunch Meals

The Northwood-Kensett Community School District will once again be participating in the Summer Food Service Program. This continues to be an opportunity for the district to provide a variety of meals during the summer for young people, who perhaps rely on their school the rest of the year for their best source of healthy food.

The district will provide free lunches to any child ages 1-18. There are no family income requirements, and those participating do not have to live in the district to receive lunch. Children enrolled in daycare, or participating in youth and community activities and groups are welcome. Adults may also participate in the program for a minimal cost of \$4.85 per person.

Lunch meals will be served at the N-K elementary cafeteria, Monday through Friday, beginning May 28 and ending July 26. Serving time is 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Those taking part in the meal should enter the elementary cafeteria through the entrance of elementary bus drop-off door.

Thanks to the Northwood-Kensett Community Education Foundation, NK Elementary students will be able to visit with another lowa Author this year!




Every year the classrooms decorate their door to promote reading. Again this year, we will challenge students to help their teachers to *CREATE*.






Our new Ag. teacher, Mr. Christian Miller, will be teaching a few familiar and several new courses next year in the Ag. department. Look for those descriptions soon.

Dear Parent or Guardian:

We will again be hosting a Sports Physical Clinic at the High School for all students <u>FREE</u> of charge. A sports physical is required for all athletic participants and is valid for 1 year and one month after the issue date. We will be holding the clinic on 2 different days to accommodate schedules.

Below is the assigned date and time for your child. We have split them up by grade level. Please review these and have your student come at the correct time and date assigned to them/their grade.

Current 6th, 7th, and 8th graders: Location: VAC Community Room

When: Wednesday, April 3rd at 3:30 pm.

Current 9th, 10th and 11th graders (12th if playing summer sport):

Location: VAC Community Room

When: Wednesday, April 17th at 3:30pm.

If this assigned day doesn't work, please let Mr. Reindl or myself know and we will get them in on a different day. Coaches have agreed to be cooperative in letting their athletes participate.

Students will be seen on a 1st come-1st served basis. Last time the wait in line averaged about 30 minutes if students didn't arrive right on time. Please remind them to not get discouraged and to not leave if the line is long! It might help to let them know that this service is FREE and benefits both them and you. They don't have to go at an inopportune time and you save money; maybe the wait time could be spent doing homework!

A consent to treat form is required to be filled out in order for your student athlete to participate; this is found on the school's website under "Nurse", along with the physical form. We ask that you help your child fill out the health and family history section on the physical form. Copies of the treatment consent and blank physical forms can also be found in the High School office. Have your child bring the consent and physical forms with them on the day of their clinic.
