FAFSA FAQs:

-What is the FAFSA? FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

-What types of financial aid are available? Grants, scholarships, loans, and work-study jobs are available. Scholarships are free money based on academic, athletic, or other achievements. Scholarships can also be based on financial need. Some scholarships have maintenance requirements (GPA, living on campus, etc.), to keep the scholarship. Work-study jobs might include working on campus as a tour guide, cafeteria worker, or tutor in exchange for a paycheck. Loans are borrowed money that you must repay, some may have interest.

-Where can the money come from?

Many schools offer financial aid from their own funds. There are outside funding sources too.




