A Word from the Principal

The change continues...

You may have seen the article in the Sharon Herald regarding the signing of Senate Bill 880 by Governor Wolf. I want to take a moment to explain what this move means for our students in Sharpsville.

Senate Bill 880 does not eliminate the Keystone exam. In fact, the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act as ESSA (ending the reign on No Child Left Behind) still requires states to assess all students each year in grades 3-8 and once in high school. So, while the Department of Education has released more control back to states and local districts, we will not see the end of mass standardized testing.

Districts across the country and in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania are essentially playing a game of 'wait and see' in regard to how all of these changes will play out in the next few years, but here is what it means for students in Pennsylvania for now:

The move by the governor to sign this bill does not take away the Keystone. It only removes passing the Keystone as a state required graduation requirement for the Class of 2017 and Class of 2018.

Students still have to take the test if they are completing the course or if they have failed the exam. Students in the Class of 2017/2018 who do not pass the Keystone will still be required to do the local project to graduate. So, it benefits them to continue their effort to pass the exam.

While the state has removed the graduation requirement of passing the Keystone, it is likely many school districts will still keep it; schools, to some degree, will still be evaluated based on student performance.

Our current freshman class, the Class of 2019, and all classes after are still (at this point) required to pass the Keystone Exam to graduate. This can change within the next two years as legislators working with the Pennsylvania Department of Education decide how to best proceed with ESSA's mandate to still assess students. For now, we will be operating with the understanding these students still fall under the state mandate.

The Herald inaccurately reported in Thursday's edition (on page A2) that, "Students who fail twice in a given test area must instead complete a project..." A more accurate statement would be that a student MUST FAIL the test twice BEFORE ENTERING the project phase. Special education students must only fail once. Both groups of students

are actually permitted to take the test 5-6 times before their senior year before having no other option but to enter the project. In fact, a student may fail an exam twice, be permitted to start the project, and still continue to make attempts to pass the test. If that student were to pass the exam while completing the project, he or she could stop the work on the project immediately.

I will be meeting with students in the following classes within the next two weeks: 2017, 2018, and 2019. During these meetings I will be explaining what they are responsible for under this move. I will also be drafting a letter to all parents and putting a notice on the website once I learn more about what our board of education plans to do.

From the Classroom

SCIENCE

Mr. Ference

Honors Physics: Students studied uniform circular motion by twirling rubber stoppers and calculating their speed. They studied the effects of varying the mass, centripetal force and radius on the speed of the object. After analyzing the results, they applied this model to explain how certain conditions (icy roads, sharper curves) effects how they drive around a curve.

Pitt Physics: The students studied conservation of momentum. They used a ballistic pendulum and the concepts of momentum conservation and energy conservation to determine the launch speed of a ball from a spring-powered launcher. In the photo, they are using projectile motion to verify the launch speed.










Ms. Saeler

Biology: The academic biology classes just completed their Benchmark exams (midterms). The Benchmark was comprised of released Keystone Biology exam questions, so the students were able to get practice taking the test and were also able to get a general idea of their preparedness for the test. The students will take a second Benchmark exam prior to the Keystone exam in April. The newest topic is DNA. Students are learning about the structure and function of DNA as a continuation of the


reproduction unit they just completed. Students model DNA and its processes using K'NEX modeling sets. Upon completion of this chapter the students will continue with the concepts of DNA as it applies to genetics.

Lit/Comp IV classes are completing Beowulf and will be presenting creative projects from a wide range of options from 2/10-11 and 2/16-17. The project is worth 100 points with the potential for 10 bonus points for creativity or excellence of presentation.

AP Composition is in the middle of a unit on Women in Time--reading about the historical beginnings of the women's rights movement up to modern-day discussions of women's "proper" role in society.


AP Literature is finishing the Modern Drama unit with August Wilson's Fences. Wilson was born in the Hill District of Pittsburgh and set many of his plays in the area. He is widely recognized as one of the best American playwrights, having been awarded two Pulitzer Prizes for writing--one of which was for Fences. The greatest challenge is in adapting to Wilson's dialogue, which represents colloquial African-American speech

Mrs. Oliver

Mrs. Oliver and her Honors Literature and Composition II class are currently participating in the Young Playwrights program. On February 11th the students will be visiting the City Theater for the performance of the show, SOME BRIGHTER DISTANCE by Keith Reddin.

Some Brighter Distance tells the story of Arthur Rudolph, a German aerospace engineer who participated in Operation Paperclip, a post-WWII program in which scientists, technicians and researchers from former Nazi Germany were brought to the United States. Playwright Keith Reddin says Cold War-era American officials hoped these individuals would help the country achieve an edge over the Soviet Union in the Space Race.

The students will eventually begin working on their very own scripts. Scripts will be evaluated by the City Theater and one will be selected to produced by the company and presented by their actors in the fall of 2016.

Ms. Gross has been working with the Community Library of the Shenango Valley in its effort to kick off their new teen programming. Representatives have been in the building to speak with students about the programming





Robotics - Mr. Miller

The Robotics Class recently had to develop official engineering plans for the base of the Battle Bot robots for the upcoming competitions. Plans had to utilize the CNC Plasma Cutter to cut aluminum sheet metal to accommodate the basic drive train, include a simplified AUTOCAD drawing for the waterjet connection, and brainstorm drive train mounting options. Entrepreneurship - Mr. Nimmo and Mr. Miller

Currently in Entrepreneurship the students are working collaboratively on their final project. The first products received a lot of guidance from Mr. Miller and Mr. Nimmo on how to get things moving and how to maintain that momentum. For the class's culminating project, the students will work more independently. Students will, like in the real business world, have to struggle through the process and apply what they know. It has been educational, for the students and for the teachers, to see how students respond to problems that occur; some struggle and some strive with the independence and responsibility they now have. They now have a few shows outside of the school scheduled this spring, so it will be an adventure to see how the students break up the work and keep each other accountable as they work to have their individual responsibilities met.





















THE ARTS


