Grade 1

Happy spring! First graders sure are "blooming" in their learning as spring is arriving. The support and practice at home continues to help. Thank you! Continue reading each night at home with your child. The paper decodable books and vocabulary word cards that come home each week are great resources for nightly practice. In Math, we will be learning about various graphs and charts as well as measurement and time. A great way to practice at home is working with an analog clock to tell time to the hour and half hour. Weather is unpredictable in the spring. Please send kids with proper outside gear for the cold days we still get. Thank you!

Grade 2

It is hard to believe we are closing in on the end of the year. It is important that your child come to school consistently and on time as we will be covering many topics as we wrap up the school year.

In science/social studies during this trimester, the students will be studying the earth's surface. They will be learning about various landforms, types of water, and how our earth changes.

The students finished writing their opinion paragraphs of the best winter activities just before conferences. Now, we are researching and writing an informative paragraph on dinosaurs.

We will finish the school year in math learning about data analysis, telling time using an analog clock to five minute, measuring to the nearest half inch or half centimeter, and recognizing geometric shapes and fractions. Please continue to work with your child on basic addition and subtraction facts so they are accurate and confident.

Grade 3

We cannot believe it is already spring! We have continued to be very busy in third grade. We are preparing for our "big test", the Forward Wisconsin Exam that will begin in April. Please try to have your child at school every day and on time especially during the month of April when we are testing. Make sure that they are well rested and prepared for the day. We have been working very hard and are excited to show what we know. We have finished up our Olympic projects and are moving on to study weather and climate in science. We are also learning about the history of Janesville, and we will be taking a field trip to the Tallman House in May. Look for more details to come. Continue to practice your multiplication facts every night and read for 20 minutes. Thank you again for all of your continued support this year.

Grade 4

The end of winter and the beginning of spring in 4th grade has been a very busy one. Students have been working hard getting ready for the Wisconsin Forward Exam. Students are taking the science, social studies, English/language arts, and math portions this year.

Along with our rigorous core subjects we have integrated two agricultural experiences, a soybean/lip balm speaker and a John Deere presentation. Along with these presentations, we have experienced a day long trip to the Capitol building and the Wisconsin Historical Museum in Madison. Students round out the year by going to some Wisconsin farms and experiencing Old World Wisconsin in June. Please continue to encourage your child to work hard and communicate upcoming events.

Dear Band and Orchestra Parents:

Spring is a busy time at school and in the music department. This is often the time of the year when school becomes a bit "routine." Beware of the shallow contention, "But I just don't have the time to continue with music when there is so much to do." Initially this statement seems to have some merit, but when parents clearly understand that music stimulates the creative mind and unleashes multidimensional thinking that reinforces the highest level of intellect, memory and sensory awareness, the argument is short-lived. The question to ask is, "Do you want children to master the disciplines required to achieve life-goals?" The obvious "yes" answer supports a continuation of music study.

In the weeks ahead, band and orchestra students will be putting the finishing touches on preparations for their spring concerts. These weeks can provide an opportunity for students to be the performer and the listener, allowing a new level of understanding and appreciation. Following are the dates and times of these concerts.

For Orchestra students, the "All-City Strings" concert will be held at Parker High School on Wednesday, April 18, at 7pm. Students will arrive around 6:00pm for this event. More information will be sent home soon.

Washington Elementary School Music News:

- Throughout the school year students have continued to study music elements including expression, rhythm, melody, harmony, texture, form and timbre. Our Quaver Music curriculum has been an important point of emphasis in assisting our learning of these elements.
- In January, our students learned music associated with the message civil rights movement led by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. We also studied different styles of music including spirituals, blues, jazz, gospel, swing, country music, folk music and rock 'n roll.
- The fourth and fifth grade students focused on the history of jazz and many of the greatest legends as they performed their annual spring sing entitled "We Haz Jazz".
- Our second and third grade students learned why music is a universal language for people of all countries as they performed their spring sing entitled "The Power of Music".
- Our kindergarten and first grade students have been learning about instruments of the orchestra including the four families: strings, woodwinds, percussion and brass.
- During the month of May, our fourth and fifth grade students will be learning to play the ukulele. We will also continue our studies with keyboard and percussion instruments.
- Our school will host professional musicians from "Opera for the Young" on Friday, April 27, 2018 as they present an operetta by Dvorak entitled "Rusalka: A tale of a Mermaid". Sixteen students from Washington Elementary School will be selected by audition to be a part of this production.
- Our students in second, third, fourth and fifth grades will end the year learning about composers from the Baroque period, Classical period, Romantic period and Impressionism. Our composer series will focus on specific composers, dates and styles associated with their music.
- Washington Singers will complete their year performing at the annual Ice Cream Social on Thursday, May 31, 2018 at 5:30 pm.



Opera for the Young

On Friday, April 27th, Washington Elementary School will be hosting a performance of an operetta entitled "Rusalka: A Mermaid's Tale". "Rusalka" is being presented by Opera for the Young, a professional company from Madison. It is being supported in part by our Washington PTA as well as a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. This performance will also feature sixteen Washington Elementary students who will be part of the chorus. The performance will be held in the Washington gymnasium and is scheduled for 9:30 am. A brief (15 minute) Q & A will follow the performance from 10:15 -10:30 am. The sixteen students (comprised of 3rd, 4th & 5th grade students) will need to rehearse with the cast prior to the performance from 8:45 am until approximately 9:20 am the morning of April 27th. This will be an exciting opportunity for our students and we are especially grateful to everyone who has worked so hard to make this possible.

"Rusalka: A Mermaid's Tale" at heart is a story about the importance of communication, accepting differences, taking responsibility for our actions, and learning to forgive. The music, composed by Antoine Dvorak, and the opera is based upon a story about mythical creatures and kingdoms of long ago. Dvorak (1841-1904) is one of the world's most famous composers of instrumental music, but virtually unknown outside of the Czech Republic as an operatic composer. "Rusalka" is Dvorak's ninth opera and a familiar fairy tale for children, "The Little Mermaid".

Synopsis:

"Rusalka: A Mermaid's Tale" moves from forest glen to coral reef where Rusalka yearns to become human because she is in love with the Prince. Rusalka's father, the Sea King warns her about people, but the mermaid goes to the Sea Witch for a magic spell. Rusalka exchanges her fish tail for legs at a price, knowing she won't be understood by humans (except for the audience). This proves to be a challenging barrier for the Prince who, after bringing Rusalka to his castle, is pursued by a foreign princess (the Sea Witch in disguise). Complications abound, aided and untangled by the Creatures of the Reef, portrayed by our Washington Elementary students who comprise sixteen members of the chorus.

Grades 4-5 Track Meet Information:**What is the Elementary Track Meet?**

It is an annual track and field meet for Janesville boys and girls in the 4th and 5th grades. This spring tradition started 91 years ago in 1927 and has been enjoyed by the students and their families throughout the years.

What are the events?

50-yard dash	Shot put
Hurdles	Softball throw
Medicine ball throw	Long jump
High jump	Frisbee throw
Relay	400 meter run

How do they learn these events?

The students are introduced to each event in physical education class. Safety precautions and helpful hints are given during the 4-week practice period. During this time, with the assistance of their physical education teacher, each student will select 3 events that they would like to compete in, not including the relay and 400 meter run. These additional 2 events are on a tryout basis. The students will compete with others of similar age and height. Boys will only compete against boys and girls against girls in their own grade level.

When and where is the track meet held?

The meet is held at Monterey Stadium on Riverside Street behind Wilson School. **5th graders will compete on Tuesday, May 22 and 4th graders on Wednesday, May 23 with Thursday, May 24 as a rain date. Washington will be competing in the morning on both days. The students will need to be at Washington at 7:45 A.M. the day of the meet. Van Galder buses will provide transportation to Monterey. The meet begins at 8:20 A.M.** After the meet, Van Galder buses will pick students up from Monterey at 11:30 A.M. and return them to Washington for lunch and the remainder of the school day. There is NO COST to you for your child's bus trip or the meet.

Can parents attend?

Yes! Parents, grandparents, etc. are welcome to attend. Students will be seated in the Washington section in the stands with their homeroom teachers. Please sit with them and cheer your child on! Dress for the weather – sweaters, jackets, hats, sunscreen or umbrellas may be needed. In case of inclement weather, a cancellation will be announced over WCLO after 7:00 a.m. the morning of the meet. Don't forget your cameras! This is an event to be shared for years to come!

Public School Open Enrollment Timelines

The State of Wisconsin has announced that the application period for open enrollment (also known as public school choice) begins in February for the following school year. Open Enrollment laws permit children to attend a public school in a school district other than the one in which they live.

The open enrollment application period for the 2018–2019 school year is from February 5, 2018 – April 30, 2018. Parents are encouraged to apply on-line at <https://dpi.wi.gov/open-enrollment>. Although on-line application is recommended, paper applications may be obtained from the Department of Public Instruction or any school district after January 15, 2018 and must be delivered (hand-delivery is recommended) to the nonresident school district during the application period. Paper applications to attend Janesville must be submitted to the Administrative Services Department no later than 4:00 p.m. on April 30th (a postmark does not constitute timely submission). Applications turned in prior to February 5th will be returned as not valid and must be resubmitted after February 5th but before April 30th.

Enrollment in a requested school or program is subject to space and other limitations and is not guaranteed. Transportation is the responsibility of the parent.

Under School District of Janesville board policy, students who attended the district under open enrollment the previous year are not required to reapply for the following school year.

An application is required for each sibling in the family. For example, if a family has one child in elementary school that has been approved for open enrollment and a new student entering kindergarten next year, the student entering kindergarten must apply for open enrollment in order to attend the School District of Janesville.

Parents will be informed in June whether their open enrollment applications have been approved or denied. The student's school or program placement will be provided in June.

Moving

If you will be moving from your current home address, please contact the Washington school office at 743-7200 as soon as possible to determine what paperwork you will need to fill out for your child to continue attending his/her current school. Please note: if you are moving to an address outside the School District of Janesville, in most cases, your child is eligible to continue attending the School District of Janesville as long as you complete the appropriate paperwork within the required timeline.

If you have any questions about school placement for a particular address please contact Administrative Services Office at 743-5006. The Administrative Services Office is open year round.



Periodo de Inscripción Abierta para las Escuelas Públicas

El Estado de Wisconsin ha anunciado que el periodo de aplicaciones para inscripción abierta (también conocido como preferencia de escuela pública), comienza en febrero para el próximo año escolar. Las leyes de Inscripción Abierta permiten que los niños asistan a una escuela pública en un distrito escolar, fuera del distrito en el que viven.

El periodo de solicitud para Inscripción Abierta para el año escolar 2018-19, es del 5 de febrero y el 30 abril de 2018. Se recomienda que los padres llenen su solicitud por internet en: <https://dpi.wi.gov/open-enrollment>. Aunque se recomienda la solicitud por internet, pueden obtenerse los formularios de solicitud en el Departamento de Instrucción Pública o en cualquier distrito escolar, después del 15 de enero de 2018 y tienen que entregarse (se recomienda la entrega en persona) al distrito escolar de no residencia, durante el periodo de solicitud. Las solicitudes tienen que entregarse en el Departamento de Servicios Administrativos, antes del las 4:00 p.m. del 30 abril (un sello del correo no constituye la entrega oportuna). Las solicitudes entregadas antes del 5 de febrero, serán devueltas como no válidas y tendrán que ser presentadas de nuevo después del 5 de febrero, pero antes del 30 abril.

La inscripción en un programa o en una escuela que se solicita, está sujeta al espacio y a otras limitaciones y no está garantizada. La transportación es responsabilidad de los padres.

Bajo la política del comité del Distrito Escolar de Janesville, los estudiantes que asistieron al distrito bajo la inscripción abierta el año anterior, no necesitan llenar una solicitud de nuevo para el año escolar siguiente.

Se requiere una solicitud para cada niño en la familia. Por ejemplo, si una familia tiene un niño en la primaria que ha sido aprobado para la inscripción abierta y a un nuevo estudiante entrando al Kínder el próximo año, el estudiante entrando al Kínder tiene que aplicar para la inscripción abierta, para poder asistir al Distrito Escolar de Janesville.

Se les informará a los padres en el mes de Abril, si su solicitud de inscripción abierta ha sido aprobada o rechazada. La colocación en el programa o escuela del estudiante, será notificada en el mes de Mayo.

Important Attendance Reminders for Parents

If you know your child will be absent, please call Washington's attendance number before school starts. The number is 608-743-7230.

Parent excused absences: According to School District Regulation 5141.1, there is a 10 day limit for parental excused absences in a school year. After the limit is reached, all future absences during the school year will be considered unexcused/truant unless they meet the following exceptions: funeral for family member, written medical excuse, court or legal procedure, religious holiday or principal excused. Please let us know in advance if you have a planned vacation or will be out of town.

Truancy/unexcused absences: Under state law, any student absent without an acceptable excuse, part of or all of five (5) or more days on which school is held during a semester is considered habitual truant. State law requires that parents/guardians of habitually truant students meet with the building administrator.

Tardies: It is important that all students arrive to school on time. The school day starts at 8:15. Being late for school hurts a child's learning more than it would seem. A student who is late 10 minutes everyday will miss almost 30 hours of instruction during the year. Being late affects a student's learning and academic growth.

Thank you for making sure your child is on time.
