Superintendent's Weekly Wrap-up: Aug. 30 - Sept. 6, 2013

Testing window for third grade reading instruction option begins Oct. 7 - Thirdgrade teachers now have several ways to comply with the reading instruction qualifications contained in the Third Grade Reading Guarantee law. One way is to earn a passing score on the *Teaching Reading: Elementary Education Test*, a test of researchbased principles of reading instruction. Registration is now open here for the first window offered for the test, also referred to as the Praxis 5203, which runs Oct. 7-19. When registering, teachers should select their employing school district or community school as a score recipient. Test windows also will be offered in December and throughout 2014. Test preparation materials and other resources are available here. Ohio's required passing score for the test is 162. The Praxis 5203 is not interchangeable with the test and coursework required to obtain a reading endorsement; however, it will provide the qualification to instruct third grade students determined to be 'not-on-track' or retained as outlined in Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee law. Parent Tips for School Success

<u>Attendance</u>. Show your child that school comes first by scheduling appointments after school, on weekends, or during school holidays. Every day or part of a day missed is a missed learning opportunity. Regular and timely attendance also helps students develop habits they will need in future schooling and jobs.

<u>Organization</u>. Organization and planning does not come easy for all children. Help your child set up a system that works for them. One idea is using a color-coded folder for each class or subject. This keeps homework, graded papers, notes, etc. at hand so that assignments are not missed. It also helps to have a regular time set aside each day for studying, homework, & reading. This gives students time to digest concepts learned during the day, eliminates cramming and last minute panic to finish projects, and reinforces that school and learning is a top priority in the home.

<u>Enthusiasm</u>. Show interest in what your child is learning by asking questions and talking to them about it. You don't have to be the expert. Have them explain or teach what they are learning to you. It will help them better understand what they've learned as well.

<u>Monitor</u>. Check in with your child each day about school. Make sure assignments and reading are complete. Use Progress Book to review grades and assignments.
