Dear Crestdale Middle Families:

I hope you and your family experienced lots of family time and relaxation during our much needed spring break!! Our students returned calm and ready for the last quarter of the school year. Please continue to support our vision by encouraging your child to remain focused and ready to complete all school work. It is crucial during these last review opportunities for our students to be punctual and in attendance daily.

We historically adjust our fourth quarter bell schedule to allow additional instructional time. As a result, the Academic Enrichment block/time is absorbed within the schedule. GLIMPSE INTO THE CLASSROOMS QUARTER 4

6th GRADE

MATH

Rolling dice, flipping coins, spinning spinners are just a few of the activities the students will be doing as they explore probability. This unit brings together all of what the students have learned all year including their studies of fractions, decimals, percents, and area. Students will learn to make predictions based on experiments and on theoretical probabilities. Students will also be spending a portion of each class reviewing for the EOG, which will take place in mid-May. All students have been given an EOG practice workbook (it is orange), which they should have with them EVERY day in class. Some of the work in this booklet will be done in class, some will be assigned as homework, and some will even count as quiz grades, so it is important that the children keep up with these.

SCIENCE

During the 4th quarter, students will wrap up their study of heat, light, and sound waves. We will end our year with Ecology. Students will learn about ecosystems, biomes, food chains/food webs, and cycles of matter. We will be spending a significant amount of time reviewing all concepts covered throughout the year in preparation for the upcoming Science End of Course test in May. It is very important that students are present each day and are active participants in our EOC review.

LANGUAGE ARTS

During the fourth quarter, students will be actively reviewing all they have learned this year. Students will be challenged to use the literacy skills to analyze texts from every genre. We will also focus on understanding test questions, using the process of RUNNERS (a test taking strategy), and justifying answer choices in preparation for the EOG.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Students will continue their study of Europe and South America. We will spend the remainder of the year discovering the people and cultures of Europe. Students will uncover the religions, languages, food, dance, and daily life styles of Europeans and South Americans. Additionally, students will continue comparing these cultures with

their own. While they compare these cultures, sixth grade students will evaluate how these cultures play a role globally in regards to economies, politics and social situations

7th GRADE

MATH

Seventh grade math students will be wrapping up the school year with units on data, equations, inequalities, functions, and expressions. Honors students will focus on Algebra readiness activities for next year. In addition, all students will be engaged in activities geared toward EOG review in the five weeks we have until the EOGs. To help students prepare for the EOGs, we need your help parents! Seventh grade students need to have certain formulas memorized for the EOG. They are not always given the formulas in the question. The formulas that the students need to memorize can be found at the following website:

http://www.iq.poquoson.org/2008vasol/7math/7math08formulasheet.htm. The only formula that is not included that they also need to know is the Volume (V) of a triangular prism, which is: V= (bh/2)(h). We have been going over these formulas in class, but it might be helpful to create flashcards at home and go over them with your child on a weekly basis. Only 5 more weeks!

SCIENCE

During the fourth quarter, your child will learn about motion, forces, and machines. By the time the students have finished this unit, they should be able to explain the following BIG ideas:

- The motion of an object can be described and predicted.
- Forces change the motion of objects in predictable ways.
- Newton's laws apply to all forces.
- Energy is transferred when a force moves an object.
- Machines help people work by changing the force applied to an object.

The BIG ideas in the chapters support an understanding of the following Unifying Principles of physical science:

- Energy changes from one form to another, but it cannot be created or destroyed.
- Physical forces affect the movement of all matter on Earth and throughout the universe.

LANGUAGE ARTS

The students will be working on various types of Poetry and will create an argumentative task that will allow them to give their perspective on a theme topic. The students will also revisit many of the objectives that will be covered on the End of Grade Test. This quarter students will prepare for the EOG by reviewing language arts concepts. Students will also participate in a literature circle. For the literature circle, students will be grouped based on the novel they select to read.

SOCIAL STUDIES

We have just concluded the study of India's path to independence led by Gandhi's philosophy of nonviolent resistance. The 4th quarter will focus on the regions of East Asia, Southeast Asia, and Australia and the Pacific Realm. This quarter will begin with the study of the history, culture, government, and economics of East Asia with a focus on China and Japan. Next, we will continue the same characteristics with Southeast Asia with a more general overall picture of the region. We will end the quarter with a study of Australia and the Pacific region.

8th GRADE

MATH

During the fourth quarter, we will focus on finishing content that has yet to be taught. We will primarily turn our attention to reviewing and preparing for the EOG (Week of May 14). Each week students will continue to be asked to complete weekly math assignments to help pinpoint and address skills and concepts that are still weak. Our hope is that these assignments will serve as an independent spiral review for the students. Please contact individual teachers if additional help or tutoring is needed. After the break, each teacher will be sharing information with parents regarding different EOG preparation opportunities.

ALGEBRA

When we return from break, we will bring closure to our study of radicals by investigating their role in the distance and midpoint formulas as well as the Pythagorean Theorem. We will conclude new content by studying statistical representation of data through matrices. Once new content is covered we will focus our attention to refreshing the students on 8th grade concepts, while also reviewing Algebra 1 concepts. Weekly Maths will continue to be assigned and will be used as a way to help the students practice and identify weak skills and concepts.

SCIENCE

During the 4th quarter students will be learning about Cells and Microbiology. Some of the topics we will be exploring are basic cell structure and function, Protists, comparing and contrasting Microbes and Pathogens. We will be spending a significant amount of time reviewing all concepts covered throughout the year in preparation for the upcoming Science EOG in May. It is very important that students are present each day and active participants in the EOG review.

LANGUAGE ARTS

As we finish up *To Kill a Mockingbird*, and head into fourth quarter, Language Arts will begin to review concepts in preparation for the EOGs. Students will use their data from class work, formative assessments, and the practice EOG to refine their specific skills of need. We will be breaking down EOG style questions, deconstructing passages, using process of elimination to find the correct answers, and justifying our answer choices. In

addition to the practice passages, we will also be playing review games such as Bingo, Jeopardy, Four Corners, Trivia, and more.

Our fourth quarter novel study will be facilitated by students through the use of literature circles. Students will choose the novel that is most appealing and work collaboratively to discuss the literary concepts in the text, share their "AHA" moments, and produce a final product that demonstrates critical thinking and a clear synthesis of the novel. Literature circles encourage all students to take on leadership roles that display their strengths and talents in Language Arts.

SOCIAL STUDIES

We will be studying westward expansion, the Antebellum period, Civil War, Reconstruction, World War I, and World War II. We will analyze the causes and effects of these various events and time periods with Document Based Questions, Socratic Seminars, group and independent projects.

6th Grade: Drawing from observation, ceramics/handbuilding, painting, color theory

7th Grade: Study Henri Matisse and fauvism, portrait drawing

8th Grade: Pop Art, printmaking, Ceramic jug heads, Paper cut molas

DRAMA

6th Grade: Introduction to Drama, Theater History, story theater, elements of drama, perform small group plays, implement theater arts vocabulary, play analysis 7th Grade: Improvisation, implementing theater arts vocabulary, elements of acting, theater history, Asian theater, small group and whole class performances 8th Grade: Improvisation, implementing theater arts vocabulary, elements of acting, theater history, Shakespeare, partner, small group and whole class performances

CTE

EBT: Students will continue to explore the functions of business through the development of Accounting Statements, Management Plans, Marketing Plans, and incorporating/understanding the use of technology in the business world. The

importance of business ethics and types of business correspondence will also be reviewed during the 4th quarter.

Keyboarding: During 4th Quarter in Keyboarding, the course will shift focus from learning typing and technique skills to Document Formatting. Students will learn how to correctly format various business and academic documents, such as personal business letters, memorandums, invitations, reports, title pages, and bibliographies. Students will continue to practice keyboarding skills, however more time will be spent learning formatting procedures in MS Word.

BUSINESS COMPUTER TECHNOLOGY (BCT)

Students will begin creating spreadsheets using Excel. They will learn how to create a spreadsheet using formulas and functions, how to insert a chart/graph, borders, and graphics into the document. After spreadsheets, students will learn the basics of how to create and manipulate a Database. They will use MS Access to create "tables", sort, and filter the Database. At the end of the course students will explore and create multimedia presentations. They will be required to create a presentation and present it to the class.

HEALTH/PE

We will be playing Football, Volleyball, Bowling, Basketball, Soccer, Ping Pong and Frisbee Golf.

SPANISH I

7th Grade: We will be studying Puerto Rico and it's world famous cellist, Pablo Casals. We will be comparing and contrasting the musical styles of Hispanic artists from a variety of countries. Also, clothing and styles will be discussed. We will review grammar concentrating on gender and adjective agreement, definite articles used with nouns, tag questions, and basic telephone conversations. Students will concentrate on improving their writing skills and compile a booklet of writing samples.

8th Grade: We will be working on being prepared for high school foreign language classes. We will be reviewing concepts presented during Spanish 1A and Spanish 1B. We are currently studying Spain and the Spanish Traditions of Flamenco Dancing, Spanish Guitar, Don Quixote, and La Corrida de Toros. Grammatically speaking, we are working on Direct Object Pronouns and attaching them to Affirmative and Negative Commands.
