Longtime Fridley School Board member Kim Sampson retires

Fridley Public Schools bid farewell to longtime Board member Kim Sampson who retired from her Board position effective December 31, 2018. Sampson was first elected to the Fridley School Board in 2000 and has served on the Board for 18 consecutive years.

A passionate supporter of community and education, Sampson has been involved in the school district since her children, daughter Andrea and son Kyle, were students at Hayes Elementary School. Both her children and her husband Dan, graduated from Fridley High School. As a member of Hayes PTO, she always sought ways that she could give back to the school and the community.



During her tenure on the Fridley School Board, Sampson served

as director, treasurer, secretary, vice chair and chair of the Board. "I feel very privileged to have served the school district in this capacity," said Sampson, adding that she appreciates and values the people on the Board, their diversity, and the different opinions they bring to their Board work.

Sampson currently works as a business manager for software giant, Oracle. She announced her intent to retire at the end of 2018 at the November Board meeting, a decision she says was based on increased responsibilities at her job. Sampson noted that the district is in a good place and she felt that it was the right time for her to make this transition.

As a member and leader of the School Board, Sampson's tenure on the Board resulted in many achievements for the school district, including upgrades of aging facilities, expansions

at both Hayes and Stevenson elementary schools, the addition of the Fridley Moore Lake Area Learning Center (ALC), district-wide transition to International Baccalaureate (IB) World Schools, implementation of All-Day Kindergarten and Voluntary Preschool (VPK), renewal of levies, district contract labor negotiations, and renewal of policies. Sampson also served as Board representative on the Wellness Committee, Finance and Facilities Committee, Curriculum Committee, Special Education Advisory Committee, Northwest Suburban Integration School District (NWSISD) Board, and North East Metro 916 Board.

Sampson said that her greatest joy is attending Fridley High School commencement ceremonies and witnessing students graduate from high school.

"I am proud of the work that our district, administrators, teachers and staff are doing to prepare students for college and careers," said Sampson, adding that the implementation of the district's AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program greatly prepares stu-



dents by teaching learning skills they can apply and use for life.



Fridley School Board member Abdisalam Adam was officially sworn into the Fridley School Board at the January 15, 2019 Board meeting. Mr. Adam will complete the remainder of former Board member Kim Sampson's term. Sampson resigned at



the end of December due to work commitments.

Adam, whose son graduated from Fridley High School in 2014, has lived in the Fridley community for 18 years. He said that the school board vacancy appealed to him as it represented an opportunity to give back and strengthen his involvement in the community.

"It is an honor and privilege for me to be selected to serve on the Board of Fridley Public Schools and I am very grateful to the School Board members for giving me this opportunity," said Adam. He added that quality public education is the cornerstone of our representative democracy in producing responsible citizens. Congratulations to the Fridley High School Math Team who ended their season on a strong note by taking 1st place in meet 5 at Orono High School on February 11, 2019. FHS senior Nathan Ramirez also earned his spot in the state competition. Ramirez was the top scorer in the entire division and scored 50 percent more points than the first runner-up.

FHS students who also scored in the top 10 included: Andy Ramirez (Gr. 9), Joe Blegen (Gr. 12), and Akshay Rai (Gr. 9).

In the Metro Alliance Division, FHS placed second, finishing just behind St. Anthony High School by only two points. FHS finished with 199 total points to St. Anthony's 201. The Metro Alliance division includes Fridley High School, St. Anthony Village, Mound Westonka High School, Orono High School, Benilde-St. Margaret's High School, Providence Academy, and Columbia Heights High School.

Fridley High School, an International Baccalaureate (IB) World School, hosted its ninth annual Silver Platter Breakfast Celebration on December 20, 2018. During the event, students who are enrolled in the full IB Diploma Programme (DP) presented their Extended Essay, a culminating research project for those pursuing the IB Diploma. This year, the celebration recognized 15 seniors who submitted their essays.

The Fridley High School seniors have the opportunity to earn an IB Diploma by completing DP core classes, assessments and exams during their junior and/or senior years of high school. A requirement of the IB Diploma, the Extended Essay is an in-depth study of a focused topic chosen within a subject group, that is intended to promote high-level research and writing skills, intellectual discovery, and creativity. This 4,000-word essay encourages students to develop college-level independent research skills.

The Silver Platter Breakfast Celebration is an opportunity for students enrolled in the full DP to be recognized by their teachers, peers, and parents for the high degree of academic rigor they have embarked on. The DP at Fridley High School is an intensive and challenging journey that greatly prepares the students enrolled for post-secondary success.

In addition to the presentation of the Extended Essays, three Class of 2018 Fridley High School graduates returned to receive their IB Diplomas. The following three students, who are now college freshmen, earned the IB Diploma: Nicolas Fite (*Georgia Institute of Technology*), Jennifer Ollila (*University of Minnesota - Duluth*), and Benjamin Stevenson (*University of Minnesota - Twin Cities*).


Fridley Middle School students participate in Inventors Fair

The Inventors Fair project fits into the inquiry-led approach, which is at the center of

an International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum framework. By working through this self-initiated and self-directed design process, students are able to further develop their skills and understanding of themselves as learners.





STEVENSON ELEMENTARY STUDENTS save and plant seeds for rain garden

On a mission to fight pollution, Stevenson kindergarten students kicked off a school-wide initiative as they 'saved seeds' on January 11, 2019. With the help of parent volunteers, the kindergarteners harvested seeds from prairie plants, which will later be transplanted into the rain and butterfly garden located in the center of the school's parking lot roundabout. This was the beginning of the Stevenson Seed Relay, which will involve all grade-levels throughout the spring.

On February 22, 2019, Stevenson 1st graders continued the relay by planting the prairie seeds. Students will monitor their growth indoors as they become seedlings. Come springtime, 2nd grade students will transplant the seedlings, setting the next steps for 3rd and 4th grade students, who will be planting more than 250 prairie plants into the butterfly and rain garden.

The school-wide initiative is a continuation of the Outdoor Learning on the Riverfront Grant from the Mississippi Watershed Management Organization. The grant provided resources to create a rain and butterfly garden at the school in 2018, as well as fund a partnership with Heidi Ferris of Growing Green Hearts. Ferris is an environment STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) education specialist who partners with schools and community groups to boost science literacy in programs and create on-site solutions for a number of today's environmental issues.



Fridley Middle School & Stevenson students pledge to #SPEAKKINDNESS



Recognizing a "person" first is always important, as someone should never be defined by a disability. On January 16, 2019, Fridley Middle School (FMS) and R.L. Stevenson Elementary School students and staff celebrated Person First Day as part of the #SpeakKindness campaign. Created by Special Olympics Minnesota, Person First Day recognizes and promotes person-first language. This means the "person" is always named first, which emphasizes the person as an individual, rather than defining them with their disability. On Person First Day, students at each school had the opportunity to add their fingerprint on a #SpeakKindness banner, symbolizing their commitment to always use person-first language, celebrate inclusion, and speak with kindness.

Both FMS and Stevenson have recently become Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools. Unified Champion Schools implement three components, including Inclusive Youth Leadership, Unified Sports and Whole School Engagement, which are all areas that are crucial for a positive and inclusive school culture. At Stevenson, students have been and will be participating in multiple school engagement opportunities including: Unity Day (October 24), Person First Day (January 16), and Respect Day (March 6). Additionally, students at Stevenson take part in Unified Physical Education classes and Unified Club, both which foster inclusive and positive school environments.

At FMS, students have the opportunity to participate in a Unified WIN (What I Need) class. WIN is a dedicated intervention or enrichment time for 7th and 8th grade students and the Unified WIN class is held once a week. During this time, students play games and participate in guided conversations and activities that allow them to build meaningful friendships with one another.

Fridley High School students attend Latino Engineering Academic Day





"The History Day project encourages curiosity about world issues and fosters international-mindedness," said FMS Individuals and Societies teacher Aaron Cuthbert. "Students learn valuable inquiry and research skills that will help them formulate effective research questions and synthesize ideas into an argument."

The grade-level wide showcase on February 13 allowed students to practice their communication and social skills as they presented their research to volunteer judges.

The Fridley High School (FHS) African American Student Union (AASU) presented at the 4th annual Cities United Black History Month event on February 22, 2019 at North Hennepin Community College. Their topic, "*Connecting Cultures Through Diversity*," focused on establishing deeper understanding of the cultural background of oneself and others. Students explained that making these connections can widen perspectives, limit misconceptions and prejudice, and help society find commonality and mutual understanding.

The Fridley AASU led three breakout sessions on the topic, presenting to over 300 students, community members, and local education and government leaders. They also spoke about how communities can build culture and diversity by providing opportunities for community members to form new connections, facilitate discussions, and promote inclusivity and openness. Through these processes, people can start to realize and acknowledge their similarities as much as their differences.

Celebrated in February, the annual Black History Month event is hosted in collaboration with the City of Brooklyn Park's Cities United Program, National Forum for Black Public Administrators and My Brother's Keeper - Brooklyn Park. The event also featured performances from local artists, a networking luncheon, sessions on uniting leaders for change and more.

Hayes and Stevenson Elementary students presented their LEGO League projects, as part of the "Mission Moon" challenge, on February 23, 2019 at Washington Technical Secondary in St. Paul. LEGO League Jr. is part of the FIRST Robotics program. The segment was created for elementary school students and is designed to introduce STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math). Hayes and Stevenson students have been working on "Mission Moon" during their after-school LEGO League Jr. club.

"Mission Moon," focuses on surviving in outer space. Each week, students brainstormed solutions to different questions around energy, air, water and other resources. To address those problems, students built a moon base and coded several LEGO-themed robots. Hayes students built and coded a sensor-driven moon rover and Stevenson students built and coded a LEGO rocket ship. Competing against 28 teams from around the metro area, the students presented their models and display boards to a panel of judges. Students were asked about their moon base, what they've learned, and the process they took to get to the final product.

FRIDLEY HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TEACH AT

Spanish Day at the MN Zoo

Fridley High School (FHS) students received a unique opportunity to teach others using their Spanish language skills on February 13, 2019. Twenty-five of the school's students studying in the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme (DP) Level 5 and 6 Spanish class took part in Spanish Day at the Minnesota Zoo, which featured students presenting to visitors in the Spanish language.



To prepare for the event, the students formed five presentation teams. Each team researched their assigned topic, which was either an animal or place, then wrote a script and practiced in front of classmates. The students were not allowed to speak any English during their presentation. As visitors asked questions at the end, students answered only in Spanish.

Emily Latzka, Spanish instructor at the high school, noted the multiple educational opportunities at play for the students.

"Every presentation from Fridley had an element of educating others on the importance of protecting endangered animals and protecting our natural resources," Latzka said. "The kids were creative and made their presentations interactive. For example, the ring-tailed lemur group even made a game for visitors to play called 'pin the tail on the lemur."

Latzka spoke of how meaningful events like these are for students learning a second language. "This opportunity allowed for DP Spanish students to put their language speaking research and skills into action outside of the classroom and in the public," she said.

Fridley Public Schools welcomes new Director of Finance and Operations

Fridley Public Schools welcomed Todd Tillung, new Director of Finance and Operations, to the administrative team in February 2019. Tillung comes to the district with over 12 years in financial management leadership roles. He oversees the finance, transportation, buildings and grounds, and nutritional services departments in the district.

Prior to his new role at Fridley, Tillung worked as the Se-

nior Finance Manager for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) which provides service to communities around the nation that are impacted by disasters. His recent work led financial support of relief operations in Texas, Florida and Puerto Rico in response to the devastation wrought by Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria. He also led federal financial oversight in disaster recovery operations in Flint, Michigan and South Carolina in the aftermath of Hurricane Matthew.

Tillung first began his career in financial management in the United States Air Force. Following over 20 years of military service, he worked in financial leadership roles at IBM and the U.S. Department of Defense.

One of Tillung's most notable military accomplishments was being selected as the U.S. Air Force Senior Financial Management NCO (Non-Commissioned Officer) of the Year in 2003. He earned this annual award based on his leadership efforts at Osan Air Base in South Korea where he also served as a First Sergeant. Tillung worked to create a tiger team that deployed a new case management system to facilitate the processing of personnel and military pay case resolution. The revised system was benchmarked and deployed at all bases across the Pacific Air Forces Headquarters. He also improved processes that led to increased accuracy rates, reduced processing time and ensured all military members were receiving their rightful earnings.

More recently while working for FEMA, Tillung created a new process within the financial management directorate Field Base Operations division that enabled the organization



to accurately capture costs associated with the movement of commodities that FEMA provides to the states.

According to Tillung, working at Fridley Public Schools is an excellent opportunity to continue his career in service.

"My career has always been about serving others, and working for Fridley Public Schools has allowed me to continue that by providing service to students," Tillung said.

"So when students enter the Fridley school system from preschool until they walk across the stage to graduate, we know that we create an environment that allows them to thrive and excel so they can continue that success post-high school."

Tillung added that his goal is to ensure that all decisions are made with a student-centered focus.

"The benefit of our students will always be our top priority," he said.

He has hit the ground running since beginning with Fridley Public Schools at the beginning of February. Tillung's first goal was to understand the depth of the Fridley community, its schools, and the connections that make all departments work together.
