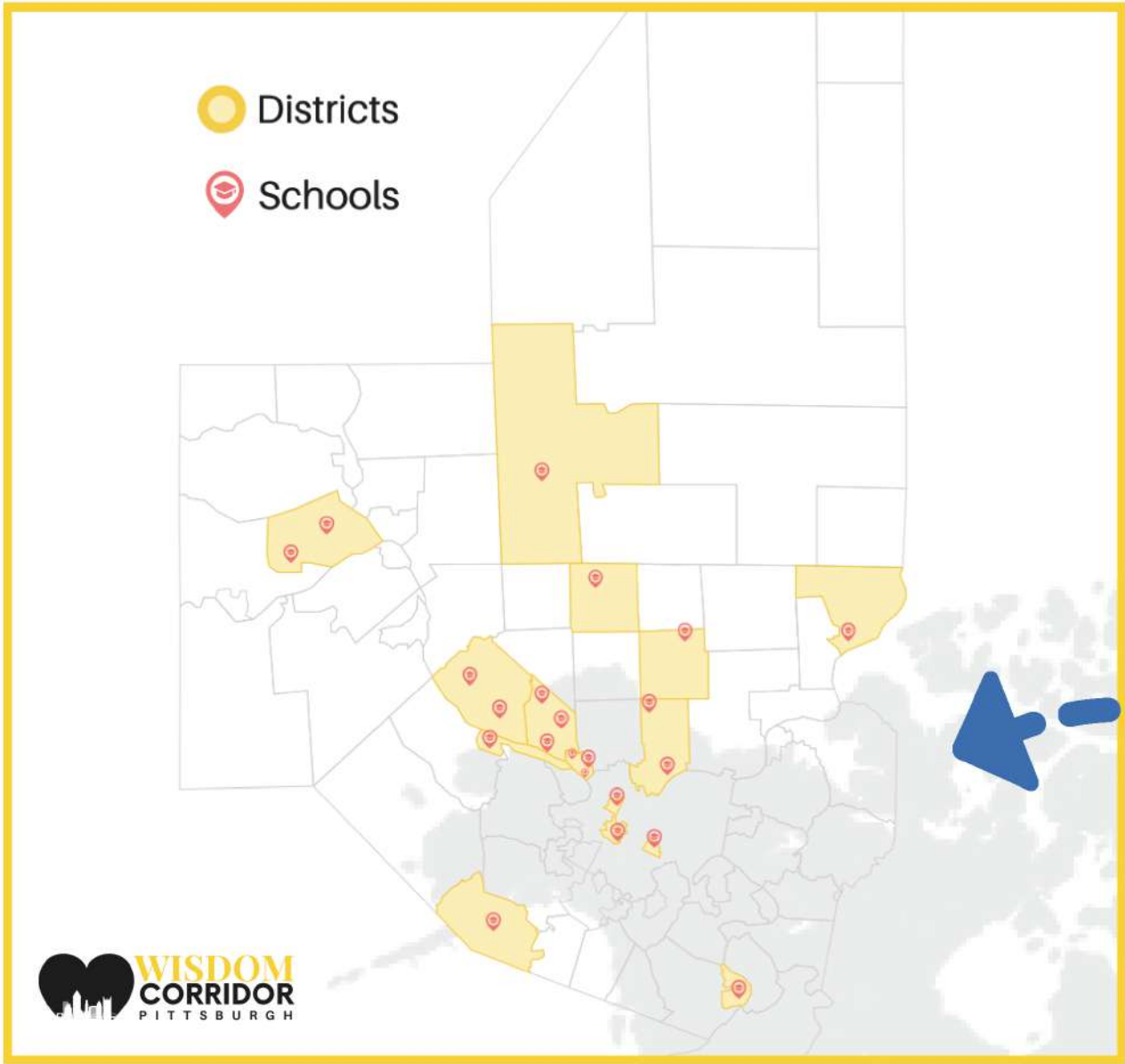

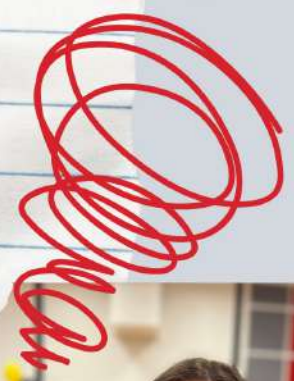

Avonworth Primary Center

Our Wisdom Corridor is filled with life lessons from children to grandparents as documented through our youth. A life lesson is a short message that people can use to teach a lesson they know, as learned through storytelling, interviewing, and documentation.

Our JAM students interviewed the teachers of the Primary Center and asked them the following question - what are your best words of wisdom? These students were ages 5-9.

We took the teachers' words of wisdom, recorded the teacher saying the words, took a picture of the teacher, and framed the information.

Among some of the best advice - "Never give up on your dreams."

Our frames are hung low so our young student population can access the QR codes with their iPads.



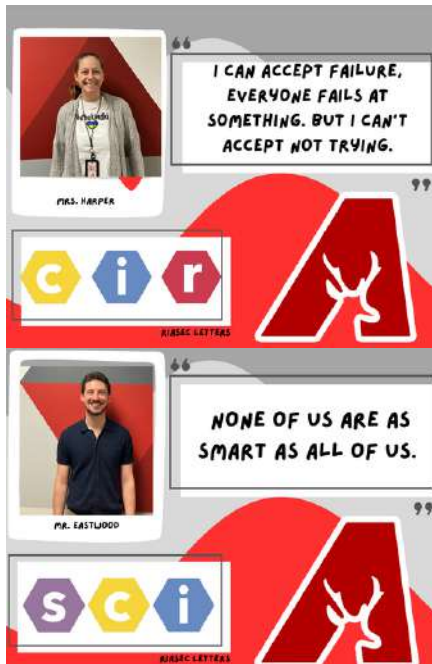
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Avonworth Elementary School



Our Wisdom Corridor Project was uniquely linked to another initiative within our school, known as the World of Work.

This program aids students in recognizing their individual strengths, utilizing John Holland's RIASEC framework (Realistic, Investigative, Artistic, Social, Enterprising, Conventional).

Through our teacher and staff displays of wisdom, we emphasize these strengths, facilitating deeper connections between our students and staff.

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Avonworth High School

The Wisdom Corridor project at Avonworth High School was executed by the Partners Media Art class.

Partners Media Art stands out as a distinctive classroom environment deliberately comprising students with disabilities alongside their student buddies.

Collaboratively, Partners conducted interviews, captured headshots, and designed individualized templates for each quote. Reflecting the inclusivity of our class, we opted for an equal distribution of quotes sourced from both teachers and students.

Additionally, each quote was accompanied by translations in various languages and braille to ensure accessibility for all.

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Beaver Area Middle School

At Beaver Area Middle School, a group of seventh and eighth grade students, with the guidance of language arts teacher Mrs. Diamond Linn and social studies teacher Mr. Ryan Hulme, created a Wisdom Corridor.

They asked teachers three important questions then selected the best answer of the three.

The students then turned the teacher responses into posters with QR codes linking to the interviews. This interactive display offers valuable advice and is set to grow each year with new contributions from students and staff.

Working closely with my kids on a project outside of my content area has helped me learn so much about that. We had such a great time, and my colleagues were so pleased with participating in the interviews!"



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Clairton High School

Clairton City School District is creating a waterfall of wisdom that flows from the senior high school all the way through to our elementary students.

At Clairton, all the students share a single building. The students, starting with high school students, will create a corridor of wisdom collected from adults in the community to gather life lessons to be shared with all.

This wisdom and knowledge will flow through all levels of the school so that all the students can learn from each other and our community.

This year, ten high school students received training from the Fuel Project to participate in the first cohort of the wisdom corridor. The students were trained to conduct interviews, using open-ended questions, to gather life lessons from adults in the district.

The students will transfer the information gained into the corridor for others to read and see. In future cohorts, extending to the middle school and all the way into the elementary level, Clairton will continue to expand this project until we have built a true waterfall of knowledge and wisdom that represents our diverse community.



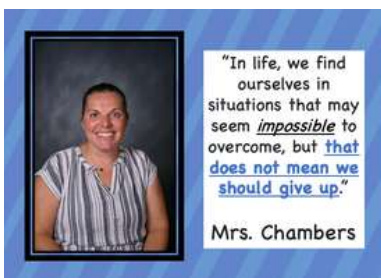
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Cornell Elementary School

Last year, about 40 students worked in small groups to interview teachers throughout the district.

The students formed their interviews into written pieces about each teacher's story behind their life lesson.

The students' work is currently hanging in the hallway that leads to our wing of the school.

Our hope is to continue adding to our Wisdom Corridor each year.

Among the interviews is teacher Mrs. Bagnato. She says, "Failure is the greatest source of wisdom." As her oldest son, Geoffrey, developed a growth mindset, she realized that she needed to have one herself!

"You can get through it"

Throughout her life, Mrs. Dayton didn't always have a super easy trail to get where she is now. When she was a young kid, about 11 or 12, her friend passed away from cancer and that was a very sad loss for her. When she was just a little bit older, around her teen years, her dad and her grandfather died. As anyone would be, she was sad and missed all of them. She tried to remember that she was loved and that she can get through the hard times. Eventually she ended up working at Eden Hall, working with kids, and doing what she loves. She got through it.

Use your imagination and you will go far

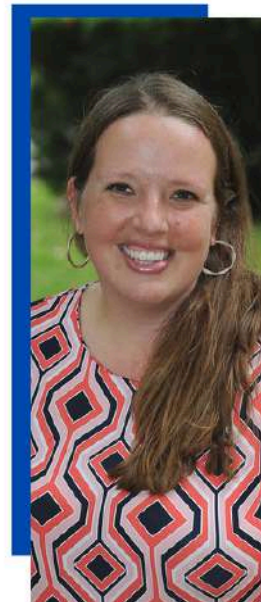

Foster Elementary School's Wisdom Squad is Mt. Lebanon School District's first cohort.

At the beginning of 2022, a group of 18 third and fourth graders were trained by Richa Nautiyal and the Project FUEL group to become empathetic interviewers. Students practiced asking open-ended questions with each other and at home to lead the interviewee to the ultimate question, "What is your life lesson?" They each chose a staff member at our school to interview formally and get their answers to the essential question. Students wrote summaries of these life lessons and they will be displayed in our Wisdom Corridor for all to read.

We also plan on publishing all of the stories in a hardback book for our school library and to donate to our local public library.



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Fred L. Aiken Elementary School

After the fifth graders interviewed the teachers and staff members at Aiken Elementary, Wisdom Corridor team leader William Oppenheim came up with the idea to paint all the words of wisdom on the ceiling tiles to be displayed outside the two fifth grade classrooms.

They labeled it the Wisdom Corridor and all the teachers phrases of wisdom were designed and painted by the fifth grader who interviewed that teacher. They came up with the design, sketched it out, and then painted it.

It also turned out to be a beautiful legacy gift for the fifth graders to leave the school before moving on to the middle school.

The students learned teachers are people that have information to share and help us grow. They learned that creativity comes in many forms when doing something artistic and they learned that we all have something to share about our lives that others can benefit from.



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Hampton Middle School

Our students chose to create a Wisdom Wall near our Special Education suite and auxiliary gym. The HMS Wisdom Squad created visual displays to hang in HMS so that whenever a student is having a tough moment, or just wants to get to know the adults in the HMS community better, they can walk through our Wisdom Wall and be inspired.

Altogether, there are life lessons and stories from 13 teachers on our Wisdom Wall, and we are getting ready to add another 10 this year. They even ended up creating their own life lesson and story, as a team, about their experience working on this project.

The students on the first Wisdom Squad at HMS were recommended by teachers and counselors because they have leadership qualities and needed a chance to use those skills. It was wonderful to see how much they grew as a team over the six months of the project!

After the wall was finished, our students were surprised with a visit from Deepak Ramola, Project FUEL founder, all the way from India, to share their hard work.



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Highlands Elementary School



The Wisdom Corridor project has been an incredible space for our elementary students. They have developed important life skills and built meaningful relationships. Throughout the project, students have been exposed to a variety of valuable lessons that have helped them learn and grow as individuals. They have been able to explore different skills such as communication, empathy, problem solving, and self-reflection, among others.

The project has also provided a platform for students to build strong bonds with their peers and teachers. Through various activities and discussions, students have been able to connect with each other on a deeper level, creating a sense of community and belonging. The Wisdom Corridor project has proven to be an invaluable experience for the students, providing them with a safe and supportive environment to explore, learn, and grow. The skills and relationships developed through this project are likely to have a positive impact on the students' personal and academic lives long even after they leave elementary school.



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Northgate School District

Our Wisdom Corridor project was a combined effort of the Northgate School District.

Both Avalon and Bellevue Elementary Schools, the middle school and the high school did the project together.

Teachers and students worked collectively to compile wisdom from teachers, students, and others from our three buildings to create our wall of wisdom.

This Wisdom Corridor brought the students out of their comfort shell.

They interviewed friends and adults outside their circle and learned social and emotional skills you cannot learn in a classroom setting. They learned to interact with peers outside their normal circle of friends by collaborating to come up with questions to ask the interviewee and create the final product.

Our display is located on the 7th floor of a local community AHN hospital that has been renovated to include new innovative spaces for learning. Northgate utilizes this space for a variety of activities.



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Quaker Valley High School

The Wisdom Corridor Project at Quaker Valley High School is promoted by our Cultural Alliance student organization.

The group's mission is to increase empathy and understand amongst different groups of people while creating a safe space for dialogue about cultural difference, skills vital for our every-changing world.

The Cultural Alliance students have used this project as an opportunity to go beneath the surface to learn about the experiences of QVHS staff or individuals of the broader community through a special memory, life lesson, or cultural connection.

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Shaler Area Elementary & High School

Students designed a colorful and creative wall to brighten the hallway.

In May 2022, they conducted student to student interviews. Some of the words of wisdom that students gathered include:

- "Go after the things that bring you the most joy."
- "Enjoy the good times and don't take anything for granted"
- "Always ask for help when you need it."



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South Fayette High School

The Wisdom Corridor Project is unique because it invites students to physicalize ideas that are often only shared verbally.

In society, we memorialize important people, places, and events. Still, the wisdom acquired from those items is rarely translated through memorialization without further consideration and study of the histories that inform such representation.

By inviting students to create artifacts that promote and share the wisdom acquired from their teachers, the Wisdom Corridor Project transcends memorialization.

Our design is a portable six-foot-tall three-dimensional tree made on a CNC machine and mounted on a pedestal that will sit near a permanent installation of a wall-mounted French cleat system that will hold the current and future teacher portraits and wisdom statements.

The tree is a metaphorical representation of how wisdom grows and enriches our lives and connects us to those who have shared their wisdom with us and with whom we will share that wisdom in the future. The tree will be placed in a transition zone in our fine arts wing.
