This year, we were honored to have the MCHS Marine Corps JROTC lead a beautiful Veterans Day Ceremony on November 9th. The event featured a keynote by Indiana Representative Pat Boy and performances by the MCHS Band and Choir. I am thrilled to announce a commendable achievement by our students. Congratulations to the **83** students who made the **Principal's Honor Roll** for the 1st grading period. This prestigious recognition requires students to have all A's in every subject. The breakdown of the honorees is as follows: **28 Freshmen, 15 Sophomores, 22 Juniors, and 18 Seniors.** Their names are available on our [website](#).

Additionally, kudos to the **356** students who made the **Academic Honor Roll** for the 1st grading period. To qualify, students must maintain a 3.0 grade point average and earn no grade below a C on their report card. The honorees include **87 Freshmen, 123 Sophomores, 94 Juniors, and 52 Seniors.** You can find their names on our [website](#) as well.

As we conclude the first semester, it's important to focus on the academic progress of our students. Failing a class results in no credit, which is crucial to remember since students need 44 credits in specific areas to graduate. For those taking Edmentum courses, an update from Edmentum Sensei will provide insights into your student's progress in these online classes.

Final exams this year are scheduled before the Winter Break. The Blue Day Finals are on December 19th, followed by the Gray Day Finals on December 20th. This schedule is thoughtfully arranged so that students are not overwhelmed, taking no more than three to four finals per day. - **Encryption:** A crucial part of cryptography, this process keeps our digital communications safe from prying eyes.

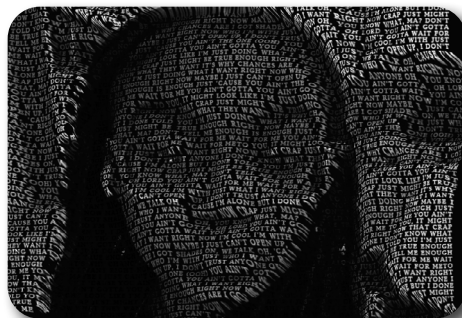

Diving deeper into the artistic possibilities, the class has explored the use of the mixer brush tool in Photoshop, learning to blend colors seamlessly on a digital canvas.

For their final project, students are embarking on an exciting challenge: following a Bob Ross tutorial to replicate one of his iconic paintings. This exercise is not just about honing their digital painting skills but also about understanding color theory, brushwork, and the joy of artistic creation.

## Principles of Computing

Our journey in Principles of Computing recently culminated in mastering Repetition Structures, rounding off with Chapter 5's exploration of Functions and Random Numbers. Students are now gearing up for their final projects, which involve creating a text-based game. This exciting endeavor will integrate everything learned this semester, including variables, loops, functions, and mathematical operations.

Post-winter break, we'll shift gears from Python to immerse ourselves in the critical field of Cybersecurity. This interlude will provide valuable insights into digital safety and security. Following this, we'll dive back into Python, equipped with a broader understanding of computing principles..

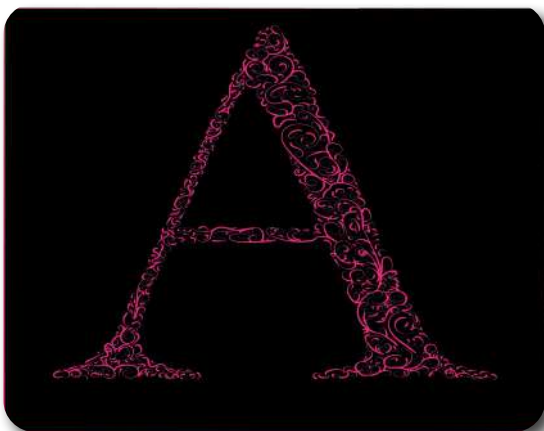
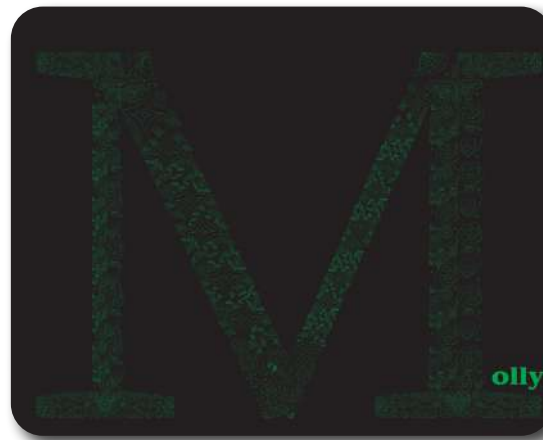
# Career & Technical Education

## Visual Communication I

Students have been working on a few different projects. Pop Art was the subject of 2 different projects: Digital transfers combine digital images with paper collage on a canvas, and the Pop Art 4 Square project has students make an Andy Warhol silk-screen-type image and add color “by hand” on the computer to create 4 different versions of the same image, which are combined into one image.

Students are also learning a fundamental part of Photoshop: how to make selections. Students practiced “cutting out” or selecting different types of objects using Photoshop’s variety of selection tools. The final project is a digital collage.

## Photography I

Students are staying busy in the darkroom printing photos. They are also working on a few digital assignments: abstract macro and Wes Anderson style symmetrical architecture photos. Abstract Macro means the photos are very close up (macro) so the subject is reduced to shape, color, texture, etc (abstract). The resulting

symmetrical, retro-looking settings and colors. Students were required to take architecture or architectural detail photos that are symmetrical. Again, the photos turned out great!

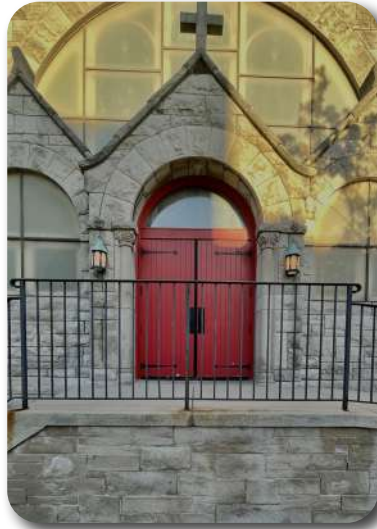

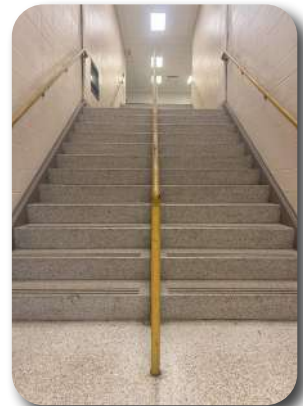

# MCJROTC

## **MCHS MCJROTC HOSTS DRILL MEET, EARNS AWARDS**

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) hosted a military drill competition on Saturday, November 4th. The

Wolves earned 3rd place trophies for Color Guard and Exhibition, and a 2nd place for Regulation in the Armed Division. They also earned a second place for Color Guard in the Unarmed Division. The University of Notre Dame Navy/Marine Corps ROTC provided the judges.

“For being this early in the year, our cadets drilled very well,” said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. “Particularly since most of our Drill Team are also on our Raider Team, it is a real tribute to the versatility and work ethic of City cadets to compete on such a high level on back-to-back Saturdays.”

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, complimented the younger cadets on their performance. “One-third of our team are drilling competitively for the first time. I have to hand it to our senior cadets for bringing our first-years up to the level where we are very competitive.”

The Wolves next meet will be at Portage on December 2nd. The sectional championship will be at Indianapolis Ben Davis on January 27th. If MCHS wins that meet, they would go to the National Championship in Washington, DC in the Spring. That trip, like all MCJROTC activities, is done at no cost to the student or MCHS. The Marine Corps funds all activities.

In addition to the Drill Team, the cadets will be honoring veterans on Thursday, November 9th, with a ceremony at the MCHS Gym at 1:30 pm in anticipation of Veterans Day. The ceremony, conducted with the MCHS Band and Choir, is open to the public. MCHS particularly encourages all veterans to attend, as they will be honored during the ceremony. The following day, the cadets will honor the U.S. Marine Corps with its Birthday Ball. Friday, November 10th, is the 248th birthday of the Marine Corps. The following Saturday, November 18th, the Wolves will travel to Indianapolis to compete in Ben Davis’ Raider competition. After the Thanksgiving break, MCHS will compete in Portage’s Drill Meet, and turn around that evening to march in the Michigan City Christmas Parade. They will also be supporting the Michigan City Area Schools One City

One Sound concert on December 7th, the Salvation Army Holiday food and gift donations drive, and providing the Color Guards for all home basketball games.





# MCJROTC

## MCCHS JROTC Secures Top Spot in Indianapolis

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Wolves Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) competed in a Raider competition at Indianapolis Ben Davis High School on Saturday, November 18th. Raiders is a physically challenging event, requiring cadets to work together to accomplish objectives roughly based on skills required in combat. The Wolves won the Tug-of-War event, placed second in the Physical Fitness Challenge, and earned 3rd place in the Rope Bridge, Sandbag Relay, and Tire Flip.

“Our cadets really improved from our first meet,” said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. “Since this is our first year doing Raiders, I think we are building a solid foundation from which to have really competitive teams in the future.” Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, also noted the cadets improvement, citing their hard work in practice. “These Raider meets are really physically challenging. Our cadets have put forth the effort in practice to eventually be competitive at the National level.” The Marine Corps will hold the National MCJROTC champi-

onship at Boswell, PA the last week in April.

The Wolves are hoping to obtain an at-large berth. If they do, that trip, like all MCJROTC activities, is done at no cost to MCHS or the student. They are funded by the Marine Corps. The cadets will be busy supporting MCHS and the community after returning from Thanksgiving break. They compete in a military drill meet at Portage High School on December 2nd. That night, they will march in the Michigan City Holiday parade. Cadets will provide Color Guards for the four home boys basketball games in December, as well as at the LaPorte County Courts Veterans graduation ceremony. In the spirit of the season, they will support the Michigan City Area Schools One City One Sound Holiday concert along with providing their time and talents to help the Salvation Army help the needy.



# Social Studies

The Psychology classes from our school embarked on an unforgettable educational journey to Chicago on October 31st. # Computer Science Honor Society

On November 6, students from the Michigan City High School Computer Science Honor Society (MCHS CSHS) participated in a service project that extended their learning beyond the classroom. They collaborated with the school's IT department in two key areas: disassembling and sorting Chromebook parts, and troubleshooting overheating problems in gaming computers used for Esports. This experience offered students a practical understanding of computer hardware and the complexities of maintaining high-performance gaming systems.

During their time in the IT department, the students learned about the inner workings of Chromebooks, gaining insights into electronic device lifecycle and sustainable waste management practices. In the Esports room, they investigated the causes of overheating in gaming computers, exploring factors ranging from software settings to hardware configurations to ensure efficient and problem-free game performance.

This hands-on project was more than just an educational exercise; it was a real-world application of the students' classroom knowledge. They developed essential technical, problem-solving, and teamwork skills crucial for a career in IT.

# Esports

The Esports teams at Michigan City High School (MCHS) wrapped up their fall season with a mix of challenging losses and commendable victories, laying a solid foundation for improvement in the upcoming spring season. The **Overwatch 2 Varsity** team secured one win in six matches, while the **Super Smash Bros (SSBU) Varsity** team achieved one win, two draws, and three losses. The **Rocket League Varsity** team balanced their record with three wins and three losses. Notably, the **SSBU JV (Academy)** team had an impressive record of four wins, one draw, and only one loss. In the realm of **Chess**, where MCHS students compete individually, standout player **Carlos Serrano** achieved an impressive second rank in the state among 55 participants, with two other students tied for 25th and another at 36th.

On November 4th, the MCHS Esports team hosted a 12-hour live stream on their Twitch channel to raise funds for **Extra Life**, an initiative supporting the Children's Miracle Network of Hospitals. During this engaging event, the team successfully raised **\$730** towards their \$1,500 goal, contributing to a noble cause. The SSBU team members showcased their skills at a tournament held at **Manchester University** on November 18th, marking the largest Super Smash Bros tournament in Indiana's history with 256 participants. Five MCHS students participated, facing tough competition. One student achieved a commendable 93rd place, and **Katelyn Ast**, the team's standout performer, narrowly missed securing a spot in the **Top 32**, tying for 33rd place. Her performance was particularly notable as she was on the verge of becoming the **only female** in the Top 32.

The determination and effort displayed by all MCHS Esports team members this season have been exemplary. With their eyes set on further achievements and improvements, the students are already discussing their return next year, fueled by the experiences and lessons learned from this season's competitions. The MCHS Esports program continues to grow, fostering not only gaming skills but also **teamwork**, **strategy**, and **perseverance** among its participants.

# Nurse

We are in the cold/sinus/flu season. The best way to prevent the spread of these illnesses is frequent hand washing. 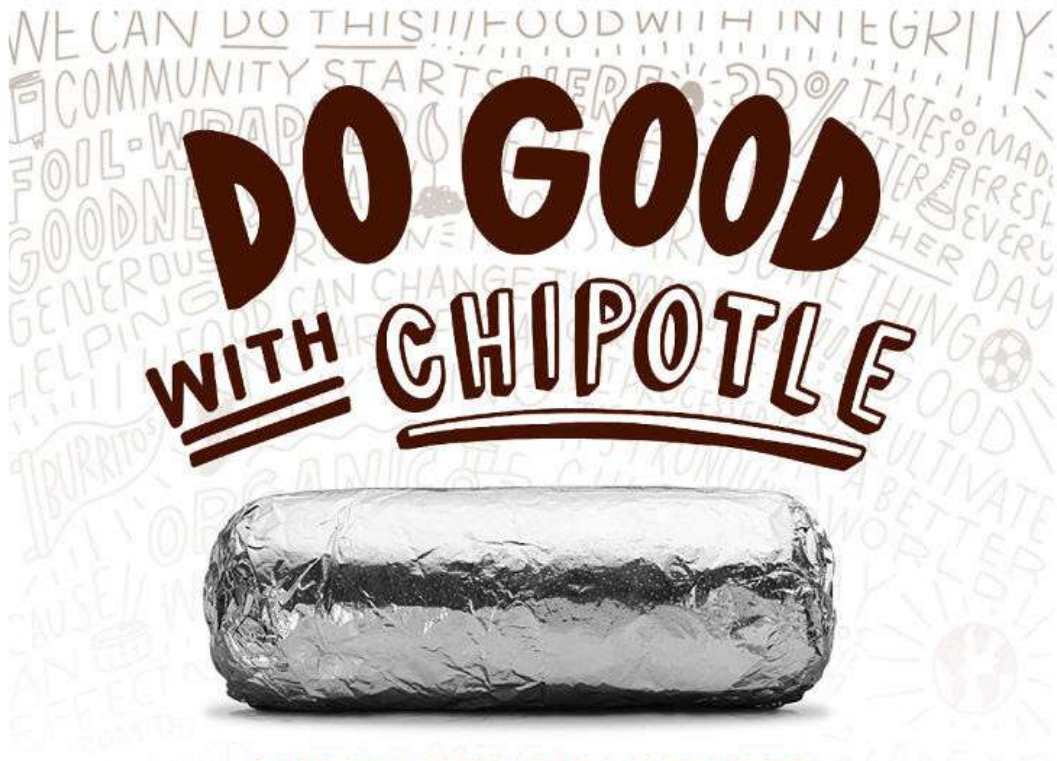
