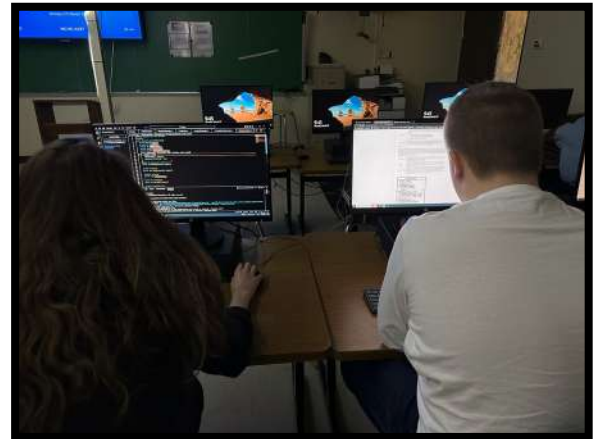
As we celebrate these achievements, let us continue to nurture and encourage the artistic growth of our students. Their artistic contributions enrich our school community and inspire us all.

Mr. Melendez's **Intro to Computer Science** class finished their Python final projects, with each student dedicating significant time and effort to their text-based games. Next school year, the course will undergo a transformation and be renamed **Principles of Computing**. This revamped class will span the entire year instead of a single semester, enabling students to grasp the material more effectively and explore the intricacies of computing further. The expanded curriculum will cover a wide range of topics, such as online safety, malicious attacks, typing skills, programming robots, and more. This update promises an enhanced learning experience for students.

Mr. Melendez's **Computer Science 1** class concluded their school year by presenting their Java final projects, demonstrating their comprehensive understanding of the material covered. Their projects showcased their skills in areas such as Arrays, Input/Output, File Data Saving, Loops, and Inheritance, among others. Several students from Computer Science 1 will now progress to Computer Science 2, a course specifically centered around CyberSecurity, allowing them to delve deeper into this field.



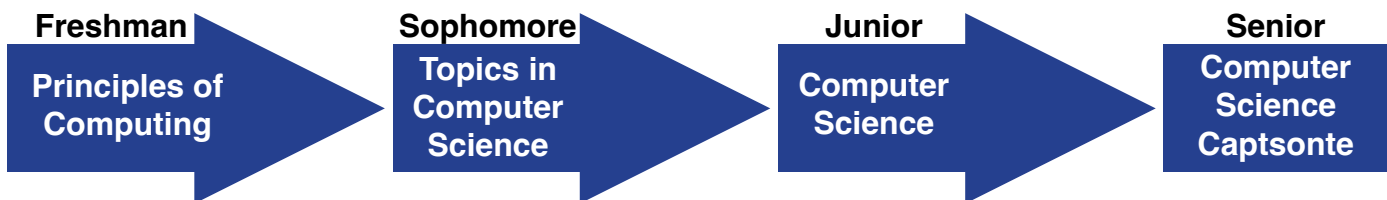

By fostering an understanding of preventative measures, including hacker prevention, the course empowers students to pursue further cybersecurity education in college and beyond. With a focus on practical application, we look forward to an engaging year filled with hands-on labs that provide students with real-life experiences in mastering these vital skills.

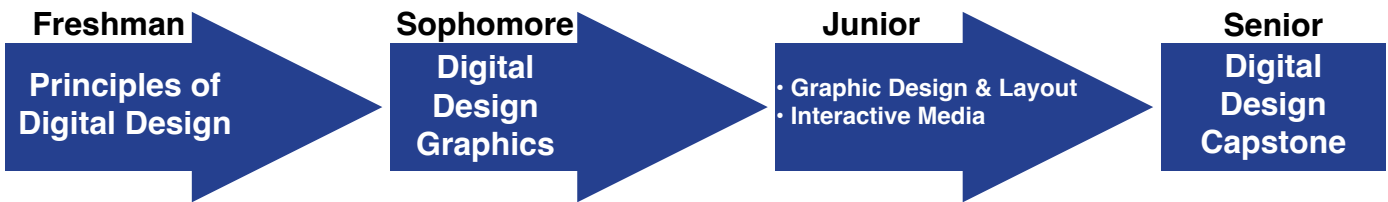

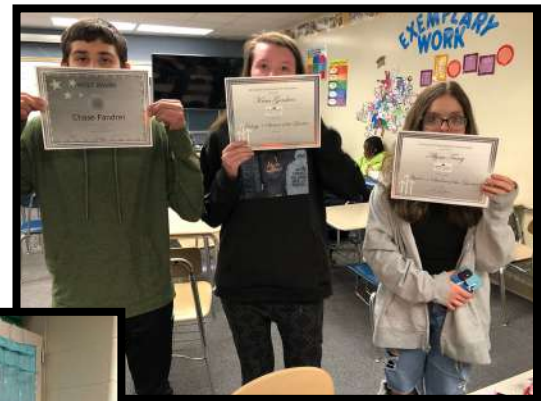

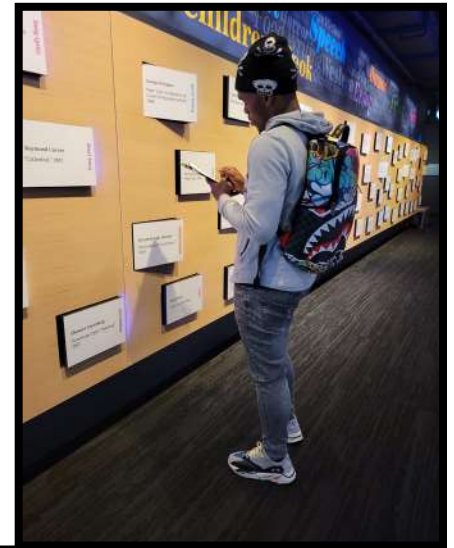

MCHS MCJROTC HONORS FALLEN HEROS

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Memorial Day is the traditional start of summer, a day for picnics, games, and getting together with family and friends. The cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) delayed their festivities to remember why this day is a national holiday- to honor those who gave their lives in the service of our country. They marched in the Michigan City parade and then participated in the memorial ceremony at Greenwood Cemetery. The parade and ceremony were organized by American Legion Post 37, with participants from all Michigan City veteran groups. "Our cadets have their priorities in the right order. It was great to see our cadets representing our school so well in the parade and ceremony," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath.

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, a veteran of the Iraq War, said that he was proud to see how well the cadets performed on this somber day. "Our cadets understand the sacrifices that have been made to keep our country the greatest country on earth."

Although school is out for the summer, the cadets will be busy supporting school and community activities. Among these are the MCHS graduation on June 4th, the Michigan City Patriotic Parade on July 1st, and the Back To School Rally on July 29th. The cadets will also be attending a Leadership Camp at St. John's Military Academy in Delafield, Wisconsin from June 5th-9th. MCHS has organized this camp, which will also be attended by MCJROTC units from Indianapolis Ben Davis, Portage and Romeoville, IL high schools. Selected cadets will also be attending the National Military Drill Camp in San Antonio, Texas and the Senior Leadership Camp near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. All camps are done at no cost to the cadet or MCHS. All costs are funded by the Marine Corps.

MCHS MCJROTC CONDUCTS LEADERSHIP CAMP

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) conducted a leadership camp at St. John's Military Academy in Delafield, Wisconsin from June 5th-9th. The camp's objective was to improve on leadership skills in a field environment that had been developed during the academic year. MCHS planned, organized and conducted the camp which was also attended by cadets from Indianapolis Ben Davis, Romeoville, IL, and Portage high schools. Among the activities were rappelling, negotiating high wire obstacles, archery, land navigation, water survival, improvised raft building, shooting shotguns and .22 caliber rifles, and paintball. The camp was conducted at no cost to the student or MCHS. The Marine Corps funded the camp.

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"It is great to see these young men and women, many of whom were pretty introverted when they started in our program, develop into take-charge leaders," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath.

Although the four schools have different demographics, Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, said that the cadets had one thing in common. "All of these kids really want to be successful in life. They know that, regardless of what career they pursue, they want to be a leader in that field."

The cadets will continue to support events in Michigan City over the summer, to include the Kiddie parade on June 24th, the Patriotic parade on July 1st, and the Michigan City Area Schools Back to School Rally on July 29th. Cadets will also be working on their military drill skills to be competitive for next year's military drill meets. The goal is to qualify for the National Drill Championship in Washington DC in April. Like the Leadership Camp, that trip would be funded by the Marine Corps.

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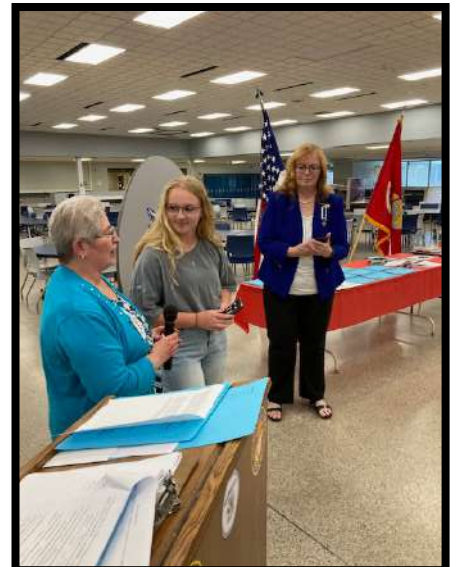
MCHS MCJROTC RECOGNIZES HARD-WORKING CADETS

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) recognized cadets for high achievement in a variety of categories at their Awards Night held at the school cafeteria on May 11th. Numerous civic organizations attended to present their awards. These included the local chapters of the Marine Corps League, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, Sons of the American Revolution, and Daughters of the American Revolution. Awards were presented for academic, extracurricular, community service, public affairs, and athletic achievement.

One of the notable recipients was senior Tristan Sherwood, a National Honor Society student who earned a 4.0 grade point average, and was a starter on the Wolves' football team. In the JROTC, he was the cadet commanding officer, a starter on the military drill team and a member of the CyberPatriot team. He is enrolled in the Air Force ROTC program at Purdue University in West Lafayette, and plans to pursue a career in the Air Force as a cyber security officer. "Tristan was an exceptional cadet for four years," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "I predict great things for him in the Air Force where he will excel as an officer."

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, noted the versatility of the cadets that were recognized. "In addition to our own extracurriculars like our Drill, Shooting and Cyberpatriot teams, we have cadets who have had noteworthy performances in athletics, band and choir. We hope that this dispels the myth that if a student does JROTC, they can't do anything else."

The cadets will be busy throughout the summer. Among their activities will be marching in the Michigan City Memorial Day and Patriotic parades, conducting a Leadership Camp in Wisconsin for 3 other schools in addition to MCHS cadets, and attending the National Drill Camp in San Antonio, Texas, and the MCJROTC Senior Leadership Camp near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Like all MCJROTC activities, these are done at no cost to the student or MCHS. All costs are covered by the Marine Corps.

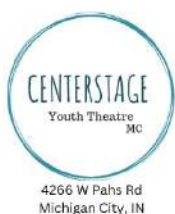
