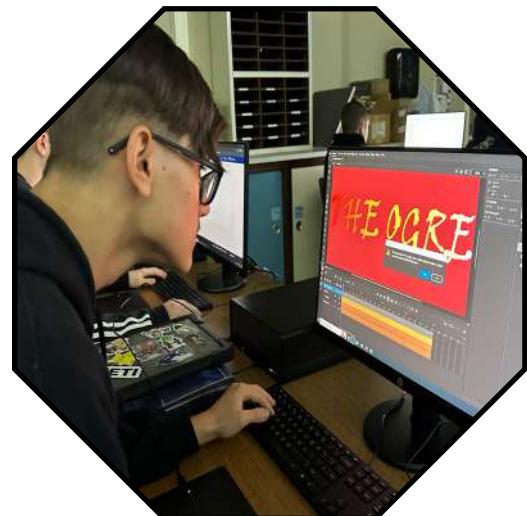
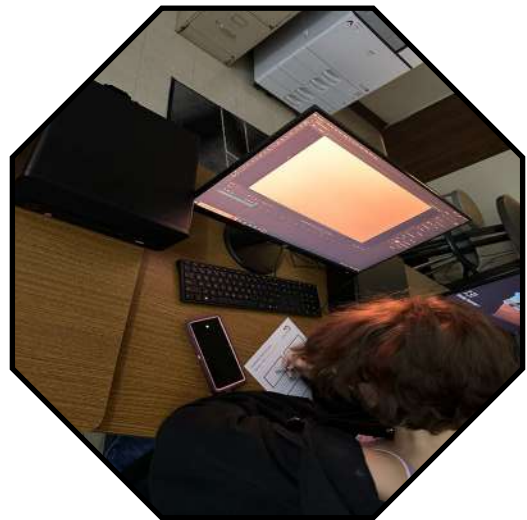
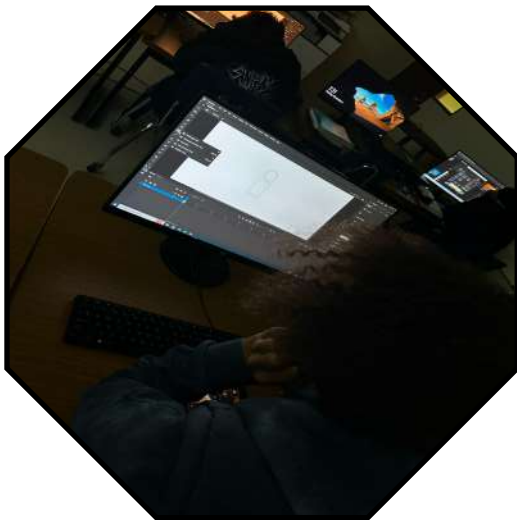

Cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) competed in the first round of CyberPatriot on October 14, 2022. CyberPatriot is the nation's largest cyber defense competition that puts high school students in charge of securing virtual networks. One of the objectives of this program is to inspire students toward careers in cybersecurity or other science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM) disciplines critical to our nation's future. The team is diverse, including Cadet Sergeant Alexandra Reed, a commander on MCHS's Military Drill Team, and Cadet 2nd Lieutenant Tristan Sherwood, the starting right guard on the Wolves football team. Sherwood is applying for the Army ROTC scholarship (worth \$180,000), plans on attending Purdue University in West Lafayette, and then serving as a Cyber Security officer in the U.S. Army after graduation.

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Major Tom McGrath, the Senior Marine Instructor, noted the tremendous opportunity this program affords for MCHS cadets. "We are so fortunate to have Mr. Ralph Gee, the Technology and Engineering teacher on our MCHS staff. His expertise in the cyber field can be the catalyst to propel our cadets into a very rewarding and lucrative career in the STEM disciplines."

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The Marine Instructor, Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, also noted how valuable Gee's knowledge is in inspiring the cadets. "Ralph is such an unselfish person who goes above and beyond in teaching our cadets, even though they are not enrolled in any of his courses."

"Considering this was the cadets first CyberPatriot competition, they really impressed me at to how quickly they adapted to the technical intricacies required of managing a virtual network," said Gee.

The Wolves will compete again in November and December. The December evolution will determine if the team qualifies to compete in future rounds. The national championship is held in the Washington, DC area. This activity, like all MCJROTC activities, are done at no cost to the student or MCHS. All expenses are funded by the Marine Corps.

In addition to CyberPatriot, the cadets will be busy through the Thanksgiving Break. They will continue to support the Wolves home football games through the playoffs. November is always a busy month, as they participate in patriotic ceremonies in conjunction with Veterans Day. This includes the ceremony MCHS will conduct on November 11th at 1:30 pm in the school gym. This ceremony, which also involves the MCHS band and choir, is open to the public. Veterans are especially encouraged to attend, as all services will be honored. MCHS will also host a military drill competition on Nov 12th in the school gym. Schools from throughout Indiana and Illinois will go at each other in different aspects of military drill. Judges will be midshipmen from the University of Notre Dame. The meet goes from 8:30 am to approximately 1:30 pm and is open to the public. Admission is free.

Michigan City Willkommen!

After a two year hiatus due to COVID, the German American Partnership Program (GAPP) is back in business! Other than the COVID disruption, Michigan City High School German language students have been participating in an exchange with a German school since 1979. The purpose of the program is to give students a good opportunity to use their German, to let our students experience the German school system, and to let our students experience life in a German family. This spring, students from our partner school, Schyren Gymnasium in Pfaffenhofen an der Ilm, will come to MCHS and live with students here to experience daily life in the US for three weeks. In the summer, MCHS students will have the opportunity to visit their exchange partners in Germany for three weeks. During this time we stay in the Alps where we go hiking and visit picturesque castles like Neuschwanstein (pictured here), experience daily life in Pfaffenhofen, and visit other major cities, such as München, Ingolstadt, and Salzburg. The first quarter of the 2022-2023 school year is now behind us. Counselors (along with Success Coaches and Assistant Principals) have been busy meeting with students who are struggling with Behavior, Grades, and/or Attendance (B.A.G.). The next student BAG report will be emailed to parents and students on November 21st. Remember, the two quarters and the semester final all work together to determine a student's final grade for the semester and a passing semester grade gives them a credit. A student must pass two of these three and show mastery to receive credit for the course. Counselors would like to encourage students to continue to work hard and to seek help when needed. Poor attendance can also greatly affect a student's grades. Getting to school and classes on time is key to your student's success. Parents and students should use the PowerSchool parent/student portal to monitor grades and attendance for each class. If you do not have a PowerSchool account or are having issues with it, please see Mrs. Krachinski in the office.

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The High School Blitz Academy (run by Safe Harbor) meets Monday – Thursday after school. This is a free program. 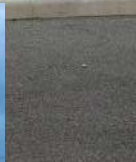
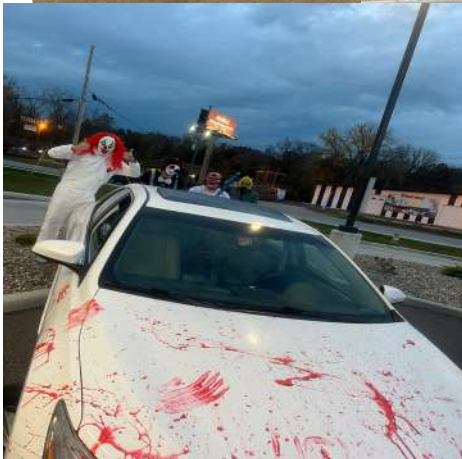


NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

MCHS Robotics Team Celebrates Alumni

Open House stresses connection between team and local employers

MICHIGAN CITY, INDIANA (October 26, 2022) – The Michigan City High School Robotics Team held an Open House on Wednesday, October 19th, to celebrate the successes of past alumni and introduce employers and university officials to current team members.

Several Robotics Team alumni were on hand for this community event, including Scott Kreighbaum, a 2018 graduate of MCHS. “From when I joined the elementary school team in 2012, to when I graduated Valparaiso University with a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering this past May, the Michigan City Robotics program has helped me greatly in my professional growth,” Kreighbaum said.

“Being on the Robotics Team taught and inspired STEM skills in me and many others, helping us to get internships at Sullair, Dwyer Instruments, Cleveland Cliffs, and Task Force Tips. I am now working locally as a Test Engineer at Sullivan Palatek, utilizing the skills I gained from being in the MCAS Safe Harbor afterschool robotics program.”

Local business leaders attending the Open House included Larry Fabina, Energy Program Director for Cleveland-Cliffs, and GAF Plant Manager Matt Hannon.

Hannon echoed Kreighbaum’s sentiments regarding STEM skill development. “It was great to see the kids so enthused about the program,” Hannon said. “There is such a need now and in the future for people interested in careers in STEM and the skilled trades. This program gives kids exposure to both and is a great way to get them interested and excited about potential careers.”

MCAS Superintendent Dr. Barbara Eason-Watkins was pleased to witness the interaction between MCHS students and community leaders. “Safe Harbor’s Michigan City Robotics program continues to motivate and engage our students, and is leading a number of them to rewarding careers in high-demand STEM-related fields,” she said.

“Our district is grateful for the educators, mentors, and business partners that are making this possible for our students.”

Angie Nelson Deutch, City Council President and President of Diversity Squared, has been a long time supporter of the Robotics Team and she was present to speak with the Robotics Team members and tour the newly upgraded lab facilities.

“I definitely believe the impact is great for these students and the progression of the alumni is impressive. I believe local companies and manufacturers should get on board to support their future employees and leaders of their companies,” Deutch said.

Another event attendee was Unity Foundation of LaPorte County President Maggi Spartz, who has followed the team since its Rookie Season in 2011.

“Over these past eleven years, the Robotics Team has created a ‘hub of hands-on learning’ that connects high school students with businesses,” she said. “The activities provided at robotics light up pathways to careers and employment. Students learn quickly what they love, or don’t love to do, creating a win-win for all.”

Robotics Team Senior Mentor Al Walus stressed the important role that local universities have had in shaping the career paths of team alumni. “While our alumni have gone on to colleges and universities across the country, several of our alumni have pursued studies locally at Purdue Northwest and Valparaiso University. We are very grateful for the support of our local university officials who joined in our Open House celebration,” Walus said.

“We really enjoyed attending the open house and seeing the facilities available to the Robotics Team at Michigan City High School,” said Doug Tougaw, Ph.D., P.E., Dean of the College of Engineering at Valparaiso University.

“Most importantly, we appreciated meeting the student members and adult leaders of the team. Our student tour guide did an amazing job! I’m grateful for this amazing program that is providing a huge benefit to the students and the community.”

Tougaw has taught MCHS/Safe Harbor Robotics Team alumni as a professor at VU. One student in particular, Justin Szaday, left a lasting impression.

“Justin is a once-in-a-generation student who impacted every class he took and every research project he worked on,” Tougaw said. “He combined genius-level intelligence with an equal level of work ethic and curiosity. I loved every minute working with him.”

Szaday has since graduated VU, earned a Ph.D. in Computer Science from the University of Illinois in May, and is now working as a Software Engineer at Google.

In reflecting on the Robotics Team journey as it enters its twelfth season, Kreighbaum concluded, “It’s great to see the growth the team has made over the years and particularly as they work alongside the Michigan City Compressed Air Academy to teach kids technical skills. Connecting youth to career paths with local Michigan City businesses is a big win for students, and a great way to support our local businesses as well.”

The Open Door Adolescent Health Center at MCHS is accepting registrations for the 2022-23 School Year!

The Open Door Adolescent Health Center is located at MCHS (Room O-111), and it provides comprehensive health and mental health services for students during the school day. Open Door works closely with the MCHS school nurse in providing supplemental services by a Family Nurse Practitioner, MSW Social Workers/Mental Health Counselors, and a Medical Director/Pediatrician. There is no cost to families for Open Door Adolescent Health Center services.

- Evaluation and treatment of minor illness or injury
- Wellness and Physical/Sports Examinations
- Preventative and Health Education
- Individual and Group Mental Health Counseling

NURSE

IF YOUR CHILD IS SICK PLEASE KEEP THEM HOME!

Students should stay home for 24 hours fever free with no medication to lower the fever. The same requirement applies if your student is vomiting. It is cold/sinus/allergy season, coughing and sneezing is to be expected however it is also symptoms of other illnesses. Please monitor your student closely if experiencing any of these symptoms. Also keep in mind the school nurse's office cannot diagnose or write prescriptions. Open Door has a nurse practitioner that is able to diagnose and prescribe medications. Your child must be registered with Open Door to be seen. Registration for Open Door can be done online thru MCAS website or in PowerSchool in the student registration section.

MEDICATIONS AT SCHOOL

Students may not carry medications on them at school unless it is ordered by a doctor and the documentation is on file in the nurse's office. If students are found with medication at school the medication will be confiscated and destroyed. Over the counter medications can be administered in the nurse's office when a medication authorization form is filled out by a parent/guardian and supplied in the original bottle by the parent/guardian. Prescription medications can be administered in the nurse's office with a prescription medication authorization form and provided in the prescription bottle.

2022-2023 Textbook Rental Fees will be loaded soon and can be viewed in your PowerSchool account or the parent portal.

All MCAS students will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP). Parents will still need to apply for the textbook assistance program in order to receive textbook assistance. This application can be completed at the time of registration and anytime during the school year. The application can be found at the Titan Family Portal, family.titank12.com.

Parents must apply for Textbook assistance EACH school year and ALL NEW STUDENTS must complete an application even if approved at the previous school.

All cafeterias are cashless and funds can be deposited to student cafeteria accounts for extra milk or la carte purchases. Please refer to the MCAS page to create your account or login.

Chromebook Insurance & Repairs

Chromebook insurance is an optional program but is highly recommended. The cost of Chromebook insurance is \$30.00 for each device and is good for **ONE SCHOOL YEAR**.

Covers 2 accidental repairs.

Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will NOT be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts and repairs will be charged to student/ parent/guardian.

INSURANCE DOES NOT COVER LOST OR STOLEN DEVICES.

Parking Permits and Expectation for Student Drivers

The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and considerations toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school.

- All Students interested in a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above).
 - All vehicles must be registered annually with the school and DISPLAY A PARKING PERMIT. Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.
 - The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents.
 - Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator.
 - Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them.
 - Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited.
DRIVE SLOWLY!
 - Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle.
 - All cars should be kept locked during school hours.
 - Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed.
- Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas.

Please Note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property.

Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following:
