





Michigan City Bienvenue!

French III and IV students at Michigan City High School welcomed a special Michigan City alum to their classroom on August 24th: Former foreign exchange student Hughes Goyé, who graduated from Rogers High School in 1988.

Goyé and his partner, Celine Octan, toured the building and spoke to Mme. Cathy LaFrance's class about French culture, food, and movies – and shared some of the differences between life as a teen in France and in the United States. Some surprising highlights:

- French high schools do not have sports or other extracurriculars; instead, students participate in community-based clubs.
- College costs are much lower in France a semester might cost around \$1,000 but does not include housing or meals.
- There is currently a mustard shortage in France!
- Teens in France can't get a driver's license until they are 18.
- Gas in France is now around 6 euros (approximately \$6.00) per gallon and recently was as high as 8 euros.

Goyé, who lived with the Hildreth family as an exchange student in 1988, told students that when he was in high school, kids spent a lot of time hanging out with friends at Marquette Mall. After a very short stint on the swim team, he found his own niche in theatre productions at Rogers, including Grease and The Wizard of Oz.

Goyé and Octan enjoyed their tour of the high school, especially Heritage Hall. "I loved to stay here," he said. "I have so many great 'souvenirs,' which is, of course, the French word for memories!"





Mr. Melendez's Computer Illustration & Graphics class started out the year learning about the history of animation. They created flipbooks to imitate frame-by-frame animation. Their next project was learning how to use a drawing tablet (Wacom One) with the Adobe Animate software. Students learned how to draw an octopus using the drawing tablet. Their project was to create and illustrate an original character design. We will be learning how to start animating objects to create full animations.

Mr. Melendez's Computer Science classes participated in an Escape Room challenge where they had to decipher encrypted messages using their new knowledge of Ceasar Ciphers. The class worked with their peers to decode the messages to find the next clue.


Sadly the two classes did not win the escape room challenge. However, the students throughly enjoyed decoding messages. They have already asked to do another escape room challenge.

The cadets provided Color Guards for numerous events over the summer. Among those were the Michigan City Patriotic Parade, the Indiana State Employees Convention, the LaPorte County Veterans Court, and Montel Williams' Veterans Home Refurbishing TV show. The cadets also did a number of community service projects which included the Adopt-a-Highway program with the local chapter of the Marine Corps League, landscaping at the Dunes Summer Theater, paper shredding/food drive at the Member's Advantage Credit Union in Michigan City, and the district Back-To-School Rally at Elston's McGill Field.

"We have very dedicated students in our program," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "Despite being on summer break, our cadets know that support for our school district and community is needed year-round."

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, noted the extra effort the current group of cadets have exhibited. "Covid really hurt us, with so many events being canceled. Our current group of cadets have really stepped up as our operational tempo has returned to normal.









Once school starts, the cadets will continue to support school activities, such as home athletic games and events in the community. They will also be starting military drill team practice, with the objective of qualifying for the National Championship meet in Washington, DC, in April.











Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) cadets Marcus Mantel and Matthew Wilson attended the National Military Drill Camp at Schreiner University in Kerrville, Texas. The objective of the camp was to prepare cadets to command units in military drill competitions and provide them with drill skills that are specific to the JROTC ("armed and unarmed exhibition" drill). The camp, like all MC-JROTC activities, was conducted at no expense to MCHS or the cadets. The Marine Corps paid for the camp and transportation to and from Texas.

"Both of these cadets are superlative representatives of MCHS," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "In addition to their dedication to the Drill Team, they are outstanding students and do many hours of community service."

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, noted the maturity and potential of each cadet. "They are only sophomores, but they have stepped up to assume leadership positions in our program. With their positive attitudes, they really set the tone for other cadets to follow their leadership by example."

Both cadets had nothing but praise for the camp. "It was great to talk to other cadets from all over the country to get their perspective as to how their programs are run," said Wilson.

Mantel noted the "tricks of the trade," particularly dealing with exhibition drill, that he learned at the camp. "I am really looking forward to sharing this knowledge with the other cadets on the drill team."

MCHS is looking forward to the upcoming drill season and trying for a berth in the National Championship meet in Washington, DC next April. The Wolves have qualified for the Nationals twice before the pandemic. With leadership from Wilson and Mantel, they are optimistic about earning a spot for the third time.


This game you see here is their version of Pictionary, however the students had different Anime shows on paper or a character on a piece of paper.







IF YOUR CHILD IS SICK PLEASE KEEP THEM HOME!

Students should stay home for 24 hours fever free with no medication to lower the fever. The same requirement applies if your student is vomiting. It is cold/sinus/allergy season, coughing and sneezing is to be expected however it is also symptoms of other illnesses. Please monitor your student closely if experiencing any of these symptoms. Also keep in mind the school nurse's office cannot diagnose or write prescriptions. Open Door has a nurse practitioner that is able to diagnose and prescribe medications. Your child must be registered with Open Door to be seen. Registration for Open Door can be done online thru MCAS website or in PowerSchool in the student registration section.

MEDICATIONS AT SCHOOL

Students may not carry medications on them at school unless it is ordered by a doctor and the documentation is on file in the nurse's office. If students are found with medication at school the medication will be confiscated and destroyed. Over the counter medications can be administered in the nurse's office when a medication authorization form is filled out by a parent/guardian and supplied in the original bottle by the parent/guardian. Prescription medications can be administered in the nurse's office with a prescription medication authorization form and provided in the prescription bottle.



The Open Door Adolescent Health Center at MCHS is accepting registrations for the 2022-23 School Year!

The Open Door Adolescent Health Center is located at MCHS (Room O-111), and it provides comprehensive health and mental health services for students during the school day. Open Door works closely with the MCHS school nurse in providing supplemental services by a Family Nurse Practitioner, MSW Social Workers/Mental Health Counselors, and a Medical Director/Pediatrician. There is no cost to families for Open Door Adolescent Health Center services.

Among the many services provided by Open Door are:

- Evaluation and treatment of minor illness or injury
- Wellness and Physical/Sports Examinations
- Preventative and Health Education
- Individual and Group Mental Health Counseling

Parking Permits Now Available!

Permits are \$20 and can be purchased at the treasurer's window. All students that are driving to school and park in the student parking lot must have a displayed parking permit. Please complete the <u>Student Driver Application</u>. The application must be completed before the time of payment

Starting October 1st, students that are parked illegally will be issued one warning ticket followed by a ticket with a fine. If warnings are ignored students may face loss of driving privileges, disciplinary action and vehicles will be towed away resulting in student responsibility for the full cost of tow.
