If you want us to bring your child to the car, please stop before the entrance to the staff parking lot. We will wave that line up once buses are loaded. Remember, you MAY NOT PASS A BUS WITH A STOP SIGN OUT and/or RED FLASHING LIGHTS! Doing so may result in a very hefty fine. Student safety is our most important job! Welcome! The start of the school year has been heartwarming. The students took a tour around the school, and they were able to see what my office space is all about. Not only am I here for illnesses or injuries that happen during the school day, but I will be teaching health lessons in the kindergarten classrooms every month. September's topic will be injury prevention. I will be discussing bus, bicycle, car, and pedestrian safety.

If your child needs medication at school for any reason, a parent or other adult needs to bring in the medication and give it to the nurse. Medications are **NOT** to be sent in with your child due to safety concerns.

If your child will be absent, please notify the school each day you are keeping your child home. If your child is home due to illness, here are the parameters for returning:

- 1. Fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing medication.
- 2. Free from vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours
- 3. Other illness such as strep or conjunctivitis requires effective antibiotics for 24 hours prior to returning.
- 4. The student is ready to play with classmates and is ready to learn. Please be mindful of others and that the illness doesn't prevent the student and classmates from participating comfortably in school activities.

Constitution Day

Constitution Day and Citizenship Day is a combined event that is annually observed in the United States on September 17^{th} . This event commemorates the formation and signing of the Constitution of the United States on September 1787.

Glen Lake School takes this opportunity annually to talk with students about our school "constitution" or rules. Glen Lake takes a positive approach to behavior in

school. We keep it simple and developmentally appropriate with just 3 rules:

- 1. Be Safe
- 2. Be Kind
- 3. Take Care of Our Things

You'd be surprised how well these rules fit virtually every situation and how easy they are for young children to understand. In observation of Constitution Day, each student will "take the pledge" to abide by these positive behaviors. They will sign their classroom "constitution" with either their name or their handprint.

Snacks and Food in School

Thank you for your cooperation in keeping all of our children safe. With food allergies always a concern, the staff at Glen Lake School thanks you for keeping peanut products at home. Should you forget and send in a peanut snack, we have other snacks (e.g. pretzels, popcorn, cheese crackers) on hand that we can substitute for your child.

Most of our 3- to 6-year-olds cannot grasp the consequences of a life-threatening allergic reaction, they can't always identify foods they are allergic to, and they frequently lack the skills to advocate for themselves. This is why we ask for your continued support in keeping peanut products out of the classroom. Peanuts are not the only food allergy our children have, which is why we also do not allow the children to share food at school. This includes

which is why we also do not allow the children to share food at school. This includes birthday cupcakes or other celebratory food. As children mature, they will be able to make safe decisions on food choices and will no longer need our help. In the meantime, we are working diligently to keep all our little ones safe. Thank you for your help and understanding!

In March 2023, Goffstown neighborhoods received neo-Nazi propaganda in their driveways.
