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Course Description: World History for juniors will cover the earliest evidence of advanced societies up to our modern post-Cold War world. Students will study major world events from every continent during every era with a focus on understanding connections and the cause-and-effect relationships between them. Students will also develop historical study and research skills necessary for independent learning and analysis.

Course Objectives:

- Students will develop the ability to analyze information using multiple primary and secondary sources and different types of evidence
- Students will develop knowledge of the earliest human societies and what conditions lead to their development
- Students will demonstrate understanding the impact of colonization and imperialism on world history
- Students will analyze the development of major empires throughout world history and the unique role which each played
- Students will understand and be able to describe the moderization of the world and the challenges and benefits that has brought
- Students will be able to identify cause and effect relationships in the course of world history and how events in one area interact with events in other areas

Assignments: Students will complete various assignments including projects, readings, participation in class discussions/debates. Make-up work MUST be made up within TWO (2) days of the absence.
